The death of Mrs. (Dr.) W. A. Baker, formerly of Peterborough occurred Thursday at Aylmer West Ontario. After the death of her husband a few years ago Mrs. Baker went to Aylmer to live with her nephew, Dr. C. W. Sinclair. The funeral service was held there with interment at Baker Hill.

The deceased was a sister-in-law of the late Seneca Baker, and years ago was quite a frequent visitor to Stouffville and Baker Hill.

During her residence in Peterborough, Mrs. Baker was an active member of Murray St. Baptist Church, and assisted for years in all its congregational work and worship.

One hundred and fifty pigs were roasted on the farm of N. O. Hippel, former M.P.P. for South Waterloo when fire destroyed the barns on his farm near Glen Morris. Visitor to Goodwood Passes with Shocking Suddenness

Resident at Goodwood for only a few weeks Walter W. Dancocks died with shocking suddenness on Thursday night at the home of his son Walter in the village. The elderly man had retired for the night, but was forced to get up and sit in a chair because of shortage of breath. A doctor was hastily summoned, but Mr. Dancocks died sitting there before the physician arrived.
