\$30,000,000 Borrowed moving to their new home in \$60,000,000 Since 1945

Ottawa, March 21-The annual report of the Canadian Farm 9.45 a.m.-Service Improvement Loans act for 1948, tabled in parliament today, shows farmers borrowed nearly \$30,000, 000 under the act in the year ending Dec. 31, 1948, an increase of 61 per cent. over the year 1947.

Since the act came into effect March 1, 1945, almost 70,000 individual loans have been made to a total of \$60,000,000. For the fourth successive year there have been no losses. Of the total of \$60,-000,000 lent, 57 per cent has been repaid. The loans are made 10.00 a.m.-Peaches through chartered banks with a 11.30 a.m.-Melville partial government guarantee.
