It has been the custom'at a certain well-known creamery in that district, as in Stouffville, for the

of butter, for which they are charged at the factory wholesale price. The Oshawa Times-Gazette is informed by an individual close to the situation that within the last month or two, the number of farmers taking home butter has dropped by about fifty percent.

Another plant closer to Oshawa has also made a practice of supplying its patrons with butter at wholesale prices, and in recent weeks, the amount of butter going out to farmers under this system has dropped by over 25 percent.

From the statements given to The Times-Gazette, the farm people must either be using a great deal less butter, or they have turned to margarine as substitute for the creamery product.
