**Area Farmers Said Using Less Butter**

Are the farmers, and particularly the cream producers, of the Oshawa-Whitby district turning from using butter in their own homes to the use of margarine? Reports from at least two butter manufacturing plants in that district make it seem likely that they may be doing just that.  
 It has been the custom at a certain well-known creamery in that district, as in Stouffville, for the patrons who bring their cream to the plant to take home their supply of butter, for which they are charged at the factory wholesale price. The Oshawa Times-Gazette is informed by an individual close to the situation that within the last month or two, the number of farmers taking home butter has dropped by about fifty percent.  
 Another plant closer to Oshawa has also made a practice of supplying its patrons with butter at wholesale prices, and in recent weeks, the amount of butter going out to farmers under this system has dropped by over 25 percent.  
 From the statements given to The Times-Gazette, the farm people must either be using a great deal less butter, or they have turned to margarine as substitute for the creamery product.

**GORMLEY**
