Million Dollar Reformatory for Pickering Township

Plans to replace the old Mercer reformatory for women with a new building have been completed, and the structure will cost several million dollars," Hon. George H. Dunbar, minister of reform institutions, said on Monday. The site will be just north of Ajax, above No. 2 Highway in Pickering Township.

"The exact location has not been decided upon yet, because of the sewer and water main problems of connecting with the Ajax system," the Minister said. He added that "our plans are well advanced as far as the building is concerned. I can't say what the cost will be, but it will be a fine institution."

Mr. Dunbar thinks the water problem might be worked out as Pickering village has voted for a water system connection with Ajax. If this is done, he said, it might reduce the cost to Pickering residents with the province sharing use of the same main.

No option has been taken on any land yet, the minister explained, but this will be done as soon as the sewer problem has been solved by the department of public works. The site will include about 50 acres.

Seventy-five years ago, the Andrew Mercer reformatory was built at 1155 King W. with money from the Mercer estate. The building is now said unfit for present requirements, with 300 inmates now serving terms there. Mr. Dunbar made the first announcement of a new reformatory to replace the Mercer over a year ago.
