**Low Wheat Costs
Big Advantage**

Low wheat costs give Canada an immense advantage in the markets of the world, Senator Thomas Wood of Saskatchewan pointed out in the Senate the other day.

He warned against the temptation of seeking higher prices than are necessary to grow our crop profitably.

In agreeing, The Financial Post says: "Excessively high prices during the first war period worked against us in two ways. They brought a lot of marginal land on this continent into production, and which later in the dry years started to blow and became a general menace. At the same time these prices encouraged uneconomic production of wheat in Europe and narrowed the Canadian markets abroad."

"In demanding an unreasonably high price for our wheat, as Senator Wood warns, we are throwing away our natural advantage of being able to produce the finest wheat in the world and at the lowest price. That is something those who would like to see Canada tied into some rigid world marketing scheme seem to forget."

**Mennonites Told
To Quit Giving
Farm Implements**

Response to the recent farm equipment program sponsored by the Mennonite Central Committee was so great that Mennonites across the Dominion had to be asked to cease their contributions. A check at the Kitchener warehouse of the Canadian headquarters revealed that it is full of plows, cultivators, wagons and other larger implements which had been sought to assist the 5,499 European Mennonites who settled in Paraguay.

"Received Too Much"
C. J. Rempel, manager of the Canadian headquarters, admitted that an overwhelming number of contributions had been received. "As a matter of fact we received too much and had to tell the people not to send any more," he said.

The extensive drive had been launched to assist the refugees who are now endeavoring to make their homes in South America. They were taken to South America from Europe through a big mass immigration program undertaken by the Canadian and American Mennonite committees.

Horse-Drawn Implements
A plea had been made by the leaders of the settlers last year for abandoned horse-drawn farm implements which they had seen in Mennonite communities during a tour of Canada.

The largest pieces of equipment are desperately needed by the settlers who are clearing farms.

Shipments are expected to be made to South America before the end of the month. Three carloads of food and clothing were sent to Europe before the end of March.

They totalled 80 tons and were valued at \$65,000. A shipment of flour was included.

**Reduced Costs,
Competition
Cut Car Prices**

Recent cuts in new car prices have emphasized a basic economic rule: what the consumer pays depends on competition, production efficiency and manufacturing costs.

The lesson was set out clearly by Ford of Canada in announcing reductions of \$30-\$114 in passenger cars and \$16-\$42 on some trucks. Nash followed suit with about the same kind of cut.

"Ford of Canada," states Executive vice-president Rhys M. Sales,

"is simply passing on the benefits of record-breaking production and sales in the first quarter of 1949 and reduced costs made possible by a greater manufacturing efficiency and slightly lower prices of a few materials."

Following comparative retail factory prices (freight, delivery charges, etc., extra) indicates how the Ford cut affects various models:

This brings the Ford de luxe coupe down to within \$87 of the similar Chevrolet model, and the Meteor \$89 closer to the Chevrolet Fleetline de luxe.

Compared With U.S. Prices
In the U.S. Ford's custom 8, virtually the same as the Canadian Meteor, was listed at \$1,550 at the factory before this week's cut. The Mercury was \$1,975 while the Chevrolet Fleet master was \$1,450 against \$1,953 in Canada.

The cuts were the fourth and fifth by the industry in the U.S. and the third and fourth in Canada. Willy-Overland led the downward trend, followed by General Motors, Kaiser-Frazer with a solid 10% slash and now Ford and Nash. Only the GM reduction did not apply here.

The question now facing the trade is: will these cuts cause the public to delay getting that new car on the chance that other manufacturers will follow suit. Any further reduction in G.M. cars is considered unlikely.

"No Comment From Others"
Chrysler has just raised prices on its 1949 models. There seemed slim chance of any reduction there.

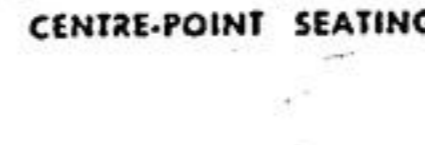
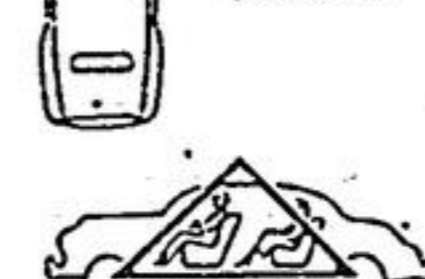
