TWP. OFFICIALS SAY STORIES OF ROAD CONDITIONS ARE EXAGGERATED BY SOUTH RATEPAYERS

Residents of Pickering Beach, and other lake front thoroughfares set off a barrage of protests last week over the alleged conditions of roads in that area. These ratepayers claim that they have been virtually isolated all winter, first by snow, then by mud. They have told the press that all efforts to reach the Road Supt. Roy Ward failed them, and that they are given the "brush off" by other officials when making their complaints. It is claimed that only one load of gravel has been brought to the Pickering Beach Rd.

Checking with township departments, The Tribune finds that where one load of gravel is claimed to have been delivered to Pickering Beach, at least six were dumped there. There has been no "brush off" at the township office as claimed, but the messages of complaint have been directed to the road dept. and the road supt. has visited the points in question, and directed gravel to be placed where he deemed necessary.

BOARD FORCED TO YIELD TO TEACHERS' THREAT-STAFF IS ADVISED TO SHUN WHITBY SCHOOL

Whitby, April 15 — By blacklisting Whitby District High School Board and by advising its member teachers through a bulletin that any member of the Federation who accepts a position on the staff of Whitby High School after this date "will not receive any support from this Federation in the salary negotiations or any aid from it in any professional difficulty in which the member may find himself," the Ontario Teachers Federation last night obtained an added \$100 increase for teachers in Whitby High School to whom the Board decides to grant the annual increment of \$100. The local teachers originally requested a total \$300 across-the-board increase in addition to the annual increment of \$100 which would have made a total of \$400 for this year starting next September but the Board had granted \$100 plus the annual increment of \$100 and set up a new salary schedule with \$3,400 maximum. The increase granted last night gives the teachers who receive the annual increment, a total increase of \$300. The Board voted 6-2 in favor of bowing to the teachers' wishes but several who voted in favor stated that they were forced to do so against their personal wishes and judgment.
