Municipalities to Pay More For Provincial Police

Services of Ontario Provincial Police will cost smaller Ontario municipalities slightly more in future, Attorney-General Blackwell announced last week.

Municipalities of less than 10,000 population who buy police services from the Ontario government will pay about \$1,900 a constable rather than the \$1,750 they have been charged under 1944 agreements.

The \$1,750 rate in relation to 1944 pay rates amounted to about 75 per cent of the actual policing cost. Since that time costs have increased and the Attorney-General's Department has decided to charge the municipalities the full cost of police services which amounted to between \$2,400 and \$2,500, a constable, Mr. Blackwell said.

Under legislation passed at the recent session of the Legislature, however, municipalities of less than 10,000 population are eligible for grants of 25 per cent of policing costs, whether they maintain their own force or buy services from the government.

This grant will reduce the actual rate charged for an O.P.P. constable to about \$1,900.

Local Field Conservation Men Visit Bradford

In preparation for the planning of the Ontario County Soil Conservation Field Day, which is to be held in the early fall, the committee of the Ontario County Crop Improvement Association which is sponsoring this event made a visit to the farm of James Steer at Bradford on Wednesday of last week.

Mr. Steer, it is stated, has his farm planned in a somewhat similar nature to the plan which is proposed for the field day in this county, incidentally the first of its kind to be held in Canada. The farm which is to be used for this field day is that of Heber Down, near Brooklin, and H. L. Fair, county agricultural representative, states that the committee in charge felt it should pay a visit to the Steer farm before making definite plans for the field day.

The Field Day Committee is composed of Vince Beaton, Blackwater; Tom Harrison, R.R.3, Beaverton; George McLaughlin, Elm-croft Farms, Oshawa; W. H. Westney, R.R.1, Pickering; Norman Down, Oshawa; Elmer Powell, R. R.1, Oshawa; Heber Down, Brooklin; John Batty, Brooklin; Leslie Smith, R.R.2, Port Perry; Howard Harper, Goodwood; Rae Ferguson, Uxbridge.

At ten a.m., the committee met representatives from the Soils Department, Guelph, and the Provincial Advisory Committee, and proceeded to Bradford to visit the farm of Mr. Steer. Lunch was taken at Newmarket, after which the party returned to the farm of Heber Down at Brooklin. There the representatives of the soils and engineering departments of the Ontario Agricultural College outlined some of the proposed projects to be carried out on this farm on the field day. At three o'clock a meeting was held in the Township Hall of Brooklin, to discuss a definite date and to name the necessary committees.

This day's proceedings marked the beginning of active planning for the Conservation Field Day, which has been approved by the Provincial Advisory Committee on Soil.

200 ORIGINALS ATTEND REUNION OF 116th BATTALION

Oshawa, April 11—Nearly 200 members of the original 116th Battalion, Ontario County's contribution to the Canadian Expeditionary Force in the First World War, met here Saturday and Sunday for their annual reunion.

It was the second time that the 116th, nicknamed the Umpty Umps, had held its reunion in Ontario County where the unit was

first recruited in 1916 at Uxbridge. Among old members present was Maj.-Gen. G. R. Peakes, V.C., who took over command from the late Col. Sam Sharpe, D.S.O., in 1918 who died as a result of long war service.
