Will Survey Mennonites' Europe Relief

First survey of European Mennonite relief posts will be made shortly by C. J. Rempel, manager of the Canadian headquarters of the Mennonite Central Committee. Scheduled to sail May 27, Mr. Rempel is making last-minute plans for the extensive tour which will take him to at least six European countries, Holland, Belgium, Switzerland, Germany, Luxembourg and France. Italy and several other countries may be included in his itinerary.

Accompanying Mr. Rempel will be two officials of the American Mennonite Central Committee. They include Prof. H. S. Bender, Goshen College, Ind., assistant secretary of the committee, and Rev. Earland Waltner of Minnesota.

Main object of the three-month trip is to study the greatest relief needs of the war-devastated countries. Millions of dollars worth of food

and clothing have been sent to Europe since the war by the Canadian committee.

Mr. Rempel will study at close range how the many Mennonite relief posts operate and how the distribution of goods is carried out.

Participate in Conference He will also participate in a number of relief conferences scheduled to be held during the summer. Basel, Switzerland, and Amsterdam, Holland, are among the centres where the meetings will be held.

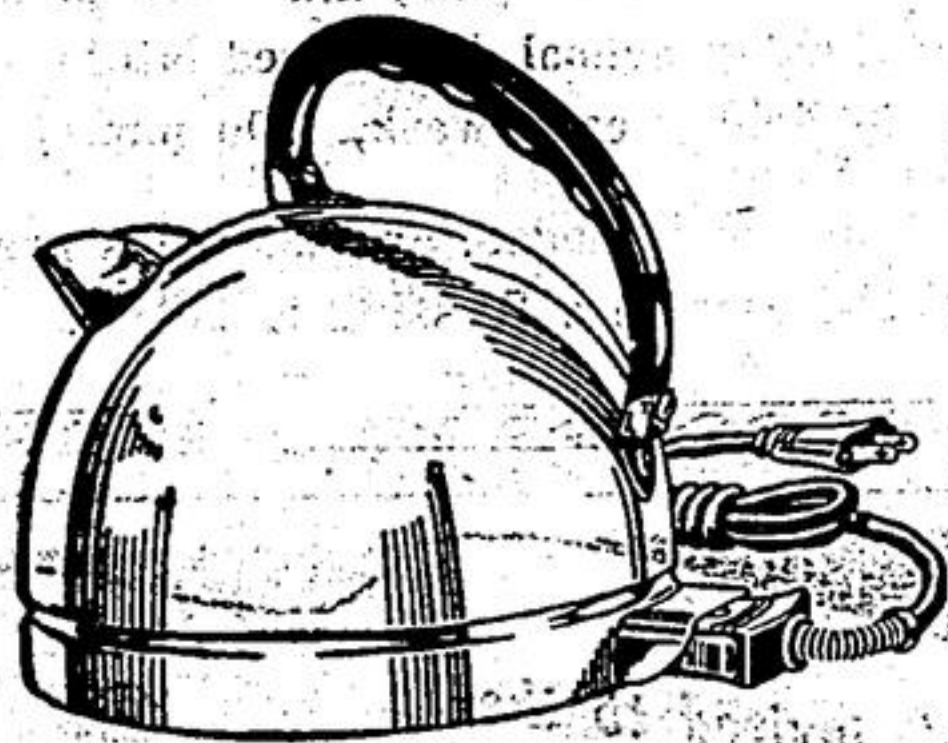
