New Fire Area Planned For Pickering Township

"A new fire area is planned in Pickering township," Reeve F. H. Westney said last week. "At present three fire areas serve the entire township. They are located at Pickering village, Brougham and Claremont."

"The proposed new fire area will serve the south western part of the township, including part of Dunbarton, East Woodlands, Fairport Beach, Rosebank and Rouge Hills districts," Reeve Westney said. He added that the amalgamation of these areas was for fire protection only and as far as he knew no change was in the offing in regard to the municipal government of these districts.

"The fire marshal for Ontario made a survey of these areas and is not satisfied with the protection afforded by the fire department in Pickering village," Albert Hull, chairman of East Woodlands' Community Centre, claims the natural growth of housing development and distances now to be travelled in this section has necessitated a fire hall and equipment in this area.

He also said it is planned to have wells dug in strategic locations to provide a reserve water supply of 20,000 gallons, at each spot.

Will License Junk Yards

A license of \$25 will be levied on all salvage yards within Pickering Township according to a bylaw passed at the regular meeting of council on Wednesday. In addition, all such yards will be required to erect a 6-foot closed board fence around their premises.

Council agreed that applications should be sought for an assistant clerk. Clerk Lloyd Johnston is carrying too great a load in his capacity as tax collector, clerk, treasurer, and relief officer, in addition to a number of other offices.

A bylaw authorizing the issuing of \$50,000 in debentures for a 4-room addition to the Dunbarton school was given the necessary three readings and passed.

Road accounts passed for payment amounted to \$5,828.77, which included two cars of dust layer. The township will provide three cars of calcium this year in all, one more than last year. Welfare accounts amounted to \$626.90, and contingencies \$1998.00.

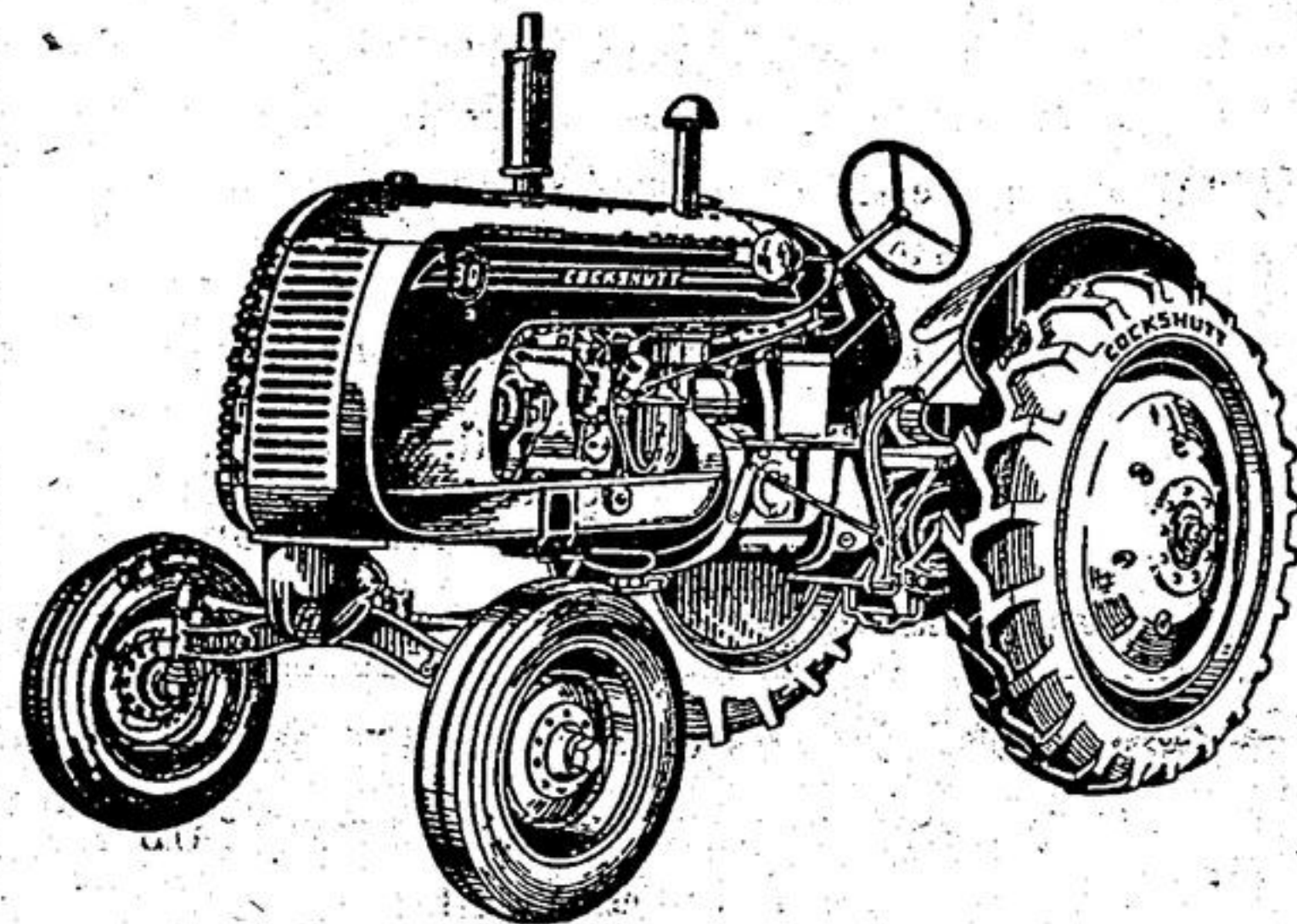

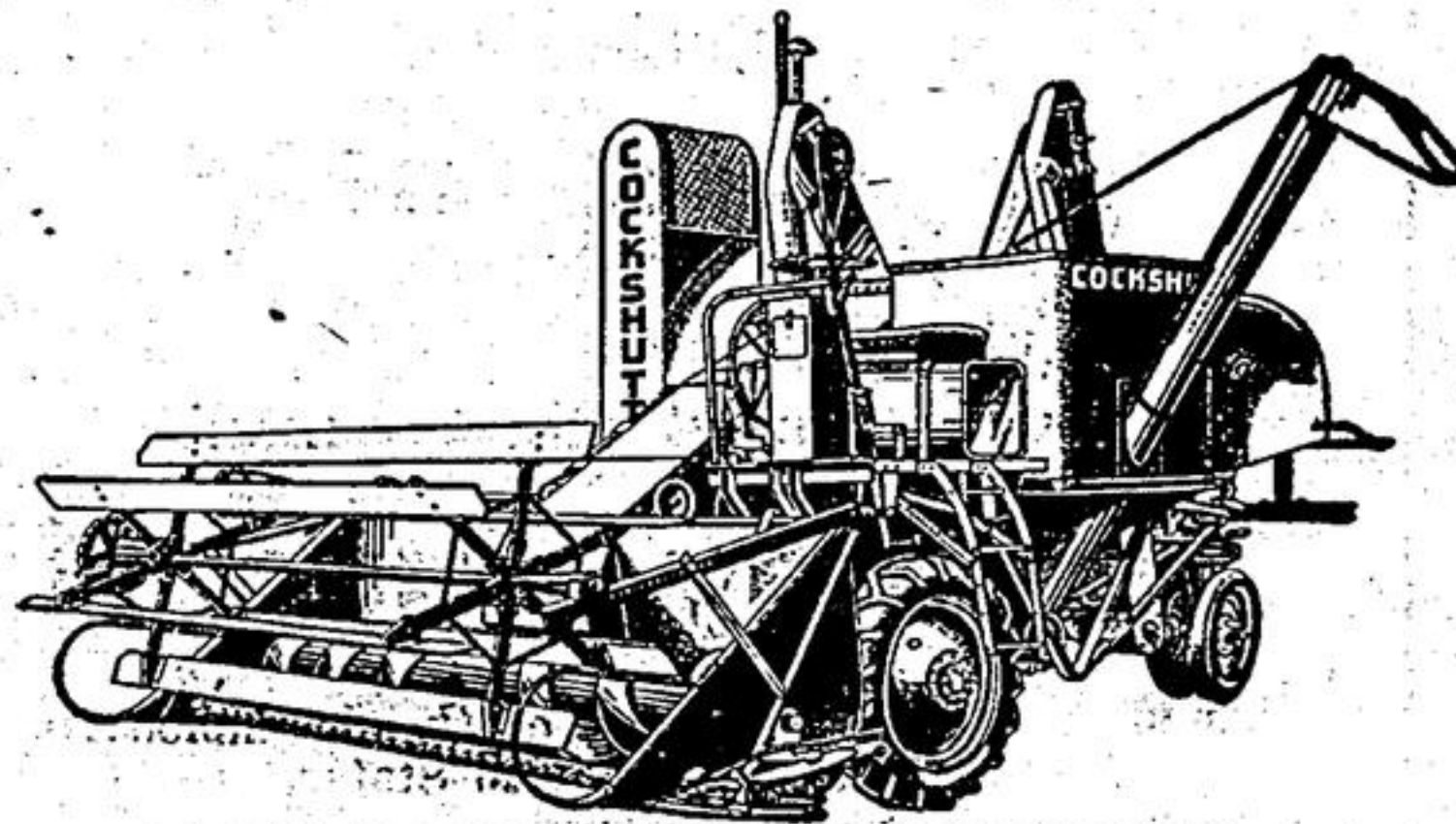
