

Farmers Seek Stabilization of Food Prices

Plans for stabilizing food prices and disposing of surplus products is under discussion by committees of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers in session at Guelph.

Public sessions of the I.F.A.P.'s third annual conference were completed at the Ontario Agricultural College last week. They will resume today, June 9, when the various committees report their recommendations. The conference will end June 11.

India Seeks Aid

Throughout the preliminary sessions delegates from 23 nations stressed the necessity of sponsoring some international system of selling farm surpluses at a profit to nations who need the food but cannot pay the price.

Prof. N. G. Ranga, president of India's major farmers organization, appealed for financial and technical assistance from richer nations. He said India required \$1,500,000,000 to assist in reaching her objective of agricultural self-sufficiency in two years.

Among the reports of member nations on the agricultural situations of their countries was that of C. Teanmo of China.

More Optimistic

His was one of the more optimistic declarations. He said that production in China was steadily increasing despite the military situation. New methods were being applied and export markets had increased lately. More tractors and labor-saving devices were being brought into the country and there was an increasing use of fertilizers.

But most of the European countries complained of loss of markets, shortage of currency and instability in prices.

At least 14 different solutions to their complaints will be placed before private committee hearings, it is reported. Full details of these plans are not available. Only one made public is the Canadian Federation of Agriculture's proposal.

Would Share Loss

This is expected to be debated at length. The Indian delegation has already announced support but it is reported that some American delegates object to it.

The Canadian plan would recommend that an International board

purchase food surpluses and resell them at a loss, the loss to be absorbed half by a central food agency and half by the producing country. It would be administered by the United Nations.

Some delegates criticize the plan as a step toward creation of a world state and excessive governmental control over agriculture.

The C.F.A. says the plan would help remove surpluses in some commodities existing in Canada at present. They say that processed milk products, tomato juice, dried beans, peas and honey are piling up.

Police Now Certain MacDonald Is Dead

Police are convinced Donald (Mickey) MacDonald is dead because they believe his mother here has not heard from him for 13 months. MacDonald, Ulyse Lauzon and Nick Minille escaped from Kingston Penitentiary in August 1947. Last year Lauzon's bullet-riddled body was found in Mississippi and Minille was returned to Kingston after his arrest in California.

Albert Mark Taylor, Newmarket, died at York County hospital on May 22, after an illness that lasted six weeks. He was born at Scarborough, August 13, 1869, and was a brother of Mrs. George Lewis of Stouffville R.R. 1. His first wife predeceased him on April 4, 1916, and he remarried to Nellie Barton on March 2, 1937. By occupation he was a lumberman and a thrasher. An adherent to the Salvation Army, his chief interests were in his home and gardening. He had four children by his first marriage and two by another marriage. Surviving is one son, Cecil Taylor, of Newmarket, and five daughters, Mrs. Earl Gaetz (Edna), Toronto, Mrs. William Perkins (Verna), Mrs. Arthur Frances (Blanche), Toronto, Hazel and Dorothy at home. A sister, Mrs. Geo. Lewis, on the 9th con. of Markham just south of Stouffville.

The funeral was held at Roadhouse and Rose chapel, Newmarket, on May 25, conducted by Lieut. and Mrs. Henderson. Pallbearers were C. Lee, A. Coltham, Mr. Starr, Roy Irwin, Everett Miller and Mr. Rose. Interment was at Newmarket cemetery.
