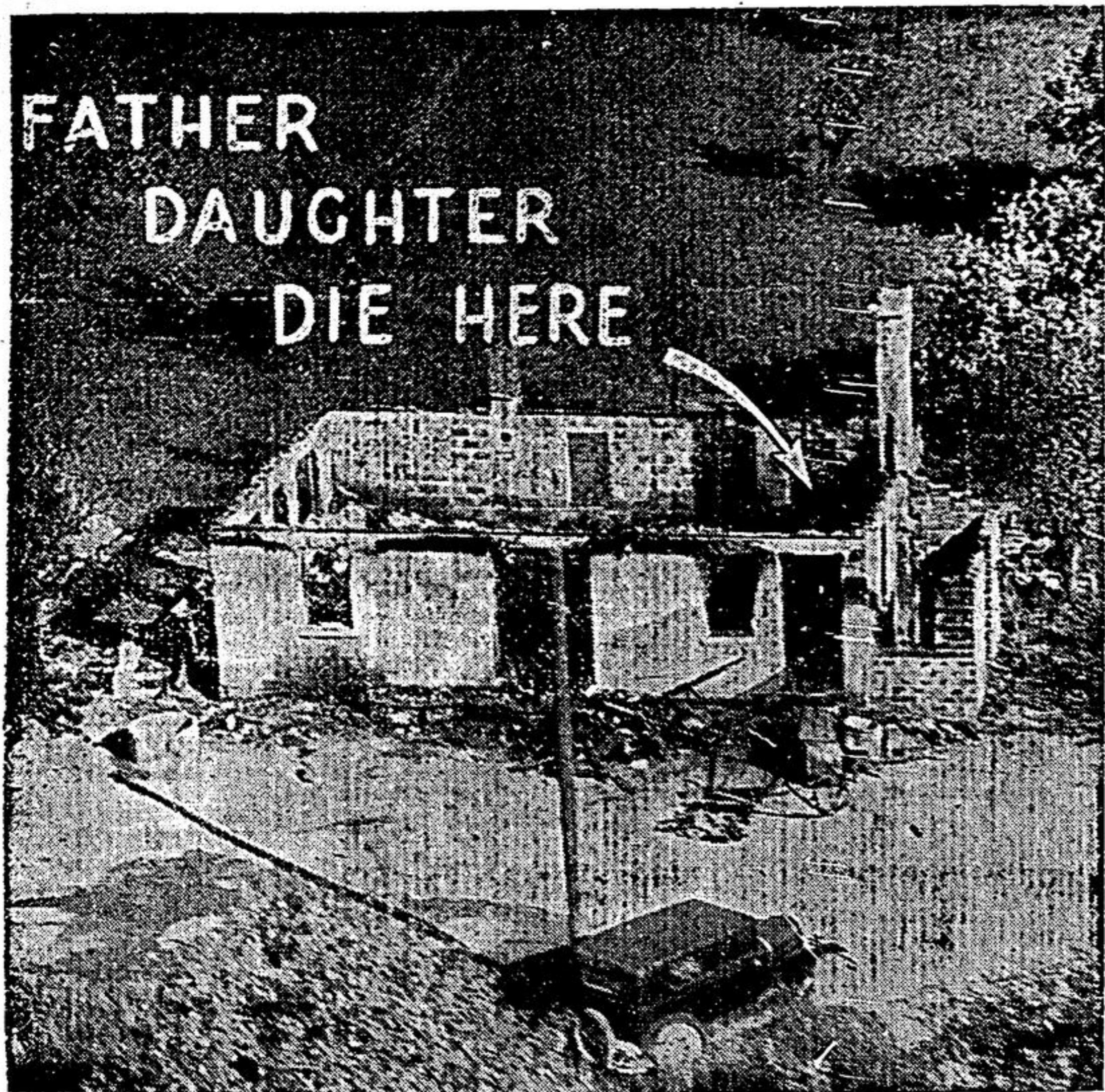


FATHER DAUGHTER DIE HERE



William Belford, 26, and his four-year-old daughter, Sharon, were burned to death when fire destroyed their storey-and-a-half bungalow at Dixie, Ont. His two sons, Ronnie and Melville, were severely burned, but Mrs. Belford and baby, Nancy,

three weeks, escaped uninjured. Children screaming upstairs woke Mrs. Belford, who when she saw flames, grabbed young baby and ran outside while her husband ran upstairs to get other children. House, seen from the air, was a raging inferno within

minutes and no one could get near it. After Mr. Belford had assisted his two sons to safety, he went back into the flames to rescue Sharon, but he never came out. The two boys were sent to Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto, where Ronnie died a day later.

Andrew Pegg Dies In 86th Year

Andrew Pegg, one of the "old timers" in the Greenwood area, died at his home there on Friday, June 3rd, in his 86th year. He had farmed near Greenwood, in Pickering township, since 1910 and prior to that time had spent some years

homesteading in Western Canada. Born in Whitechurch, Mr. Pegg was active up until about 10 years ago. His great age was believed to be a direct cause of his demise. Mrs. Pegg and all the family survive. They are Milton and Mrs. Wm. Brown, both of Pickering township; Lloyd of Oshawa; William of Greenwood; George of Whitevale;

Mrs. R. Appleby of Mount Zion; Mrs. Bertran Wilson of Ravena; Edgie and Mrs. Chas. McTaggart of Greenwood.

Mr. Pegg was a member of the Greenwood United Church. The body rested at the home, Lot 11, Con. 7, Pickering. Funeral service was held from there on Monday with interment in Salem cemetery.

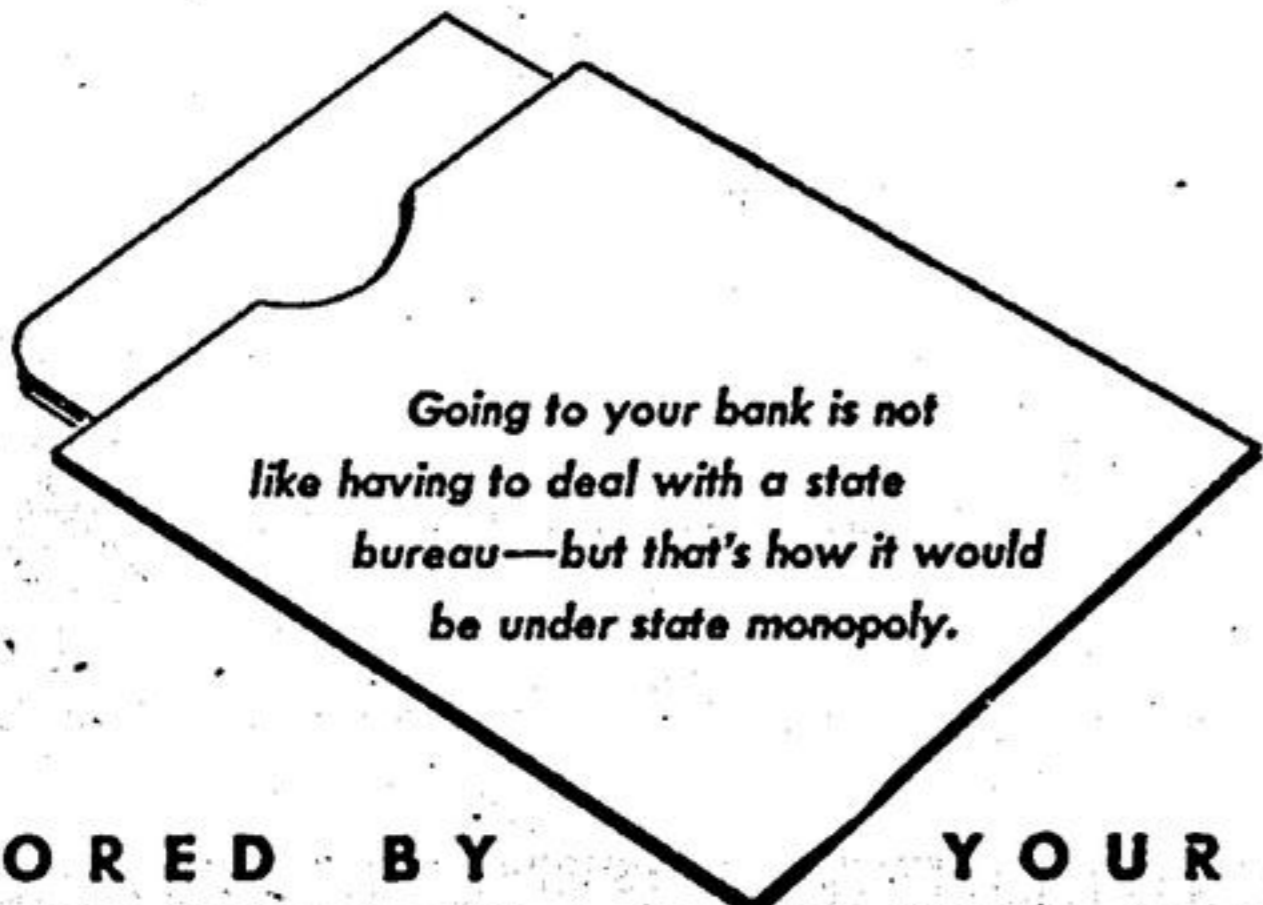

United Minister and Choir Inspire Laskay Congregation at Church Opening

Celebration of the 45th anniversary and the re-opening and dedication of Laskay United Church in the Township of King, held on Sunday, drew capacity congregations for two services conducted by visiting ministers. The interior of the building freshly decorated throughout is modern and very pleasing in detail. The cost runs well up over the \$1,000 mark. The greater percentage of expenditure has been met by the women of the congregation, whose organization raised funds for that purpose.

The morning service was taken by Rev. Lavell Smith, Toronto and the evening sermon by Rev. D. Davis, Stouffville, a former minister. The Stouffville United Church choir of more than 20 voices, directed by Mr. L. C. Murphy rendered anthems with fine quality of tone, excellent shading, and decisive interpretation. The opening anthem was symphonic in balanced precision. The men's chorus lent pleasing and fruitful variety to the musical program. The tempo of the hymn singing throughout was noted by this writer. With delightful ease the congregation was led by this excellent choir in a realm of expectancy and vitality not so often found in rural church service. The accompaniment played on the piano by the church organist, Mrs. Chas. Nolan, displayed classic interpretation. Her work stood out for sheer graciousness and delightful cadence. Both the choir and leader were behind her yet her co-ordination was perfectly timed, and with great ease.

Appreciating the background of devotion and labour of Laskay congregation, Mr. Davis congratulated the beauty of the edifice as a token of reverence toward the cause of the Church of Christ.

In his dynamic appeal, he challenged his hearers to realization of the vital problems facing the church today. Too much cordial, easy thinking, too much smug complacency and apathy, lead to the downfall of institutions but beautiful and yet dumb in vital functioning. Conviction must be expressed in action. The church, he said is the only answer to crime and juvenile delinquency. The amazing and alarming wealth spent on liquor beverage to-day far exceeds that being expended for the entire program of secular and religious education of Canadians. Mr. Davis called for young men and young women from within Laskay congregation to go forward in service of the church.

The York County Jersey Show held in conjunction with Richmond Hill's Centennial Fair on May 24th was again a fine success with a hundred head of high quality Jerseys on display before a large ringside with the awards in the various classes being made by John W. Powley, Manager of Caledon Farms, Caledon. While the bull classes were somewhat light the female classes brought out very strong competition. The largest entries were in the junior yearling and senior heifer calf classes with 19 and 16 entries respectively.

Don Head Farms' eleven year old bull, Rajah of Oaklands, was made Senior and Grand Champion and the Junior Champion ribbon went to Brampton World Beacon, Alf. Bagg & Sons, senior yearling bull. In the female championship J. A. Northey of Todmorden won the Senior and Grand on his aged imported cow, Brampton White Hope and Don Head took both reserves on Don Head Basil's Hubertine. Alf. Bagg's senior yearling heifer Edgelea Pinn Pansy won the junior championship.

In the junior showmanship competition Marlene Holmes of R.R. 1, Todmorden, won first for those under twelve and her big brother, Beverley, won the class for those 12 to 20 followed closely by Grace Hoare of Aurora, R.R. 2.
