Some Doubt About Wisdom of Tree Bylaw

The Reforestation Committee of York County Council has sent each council in the county a copy of a proposed "Tree Conservation Bylaw" and if enough councils favor the passing of the bylaw it will be enacted at the setting of county council this session.

As Whitchurch council was not fully decided in favor of the bylaw the matter was left in the hands of the reeve and deputy reeve to act on as they see fit when county council takes up the matter.

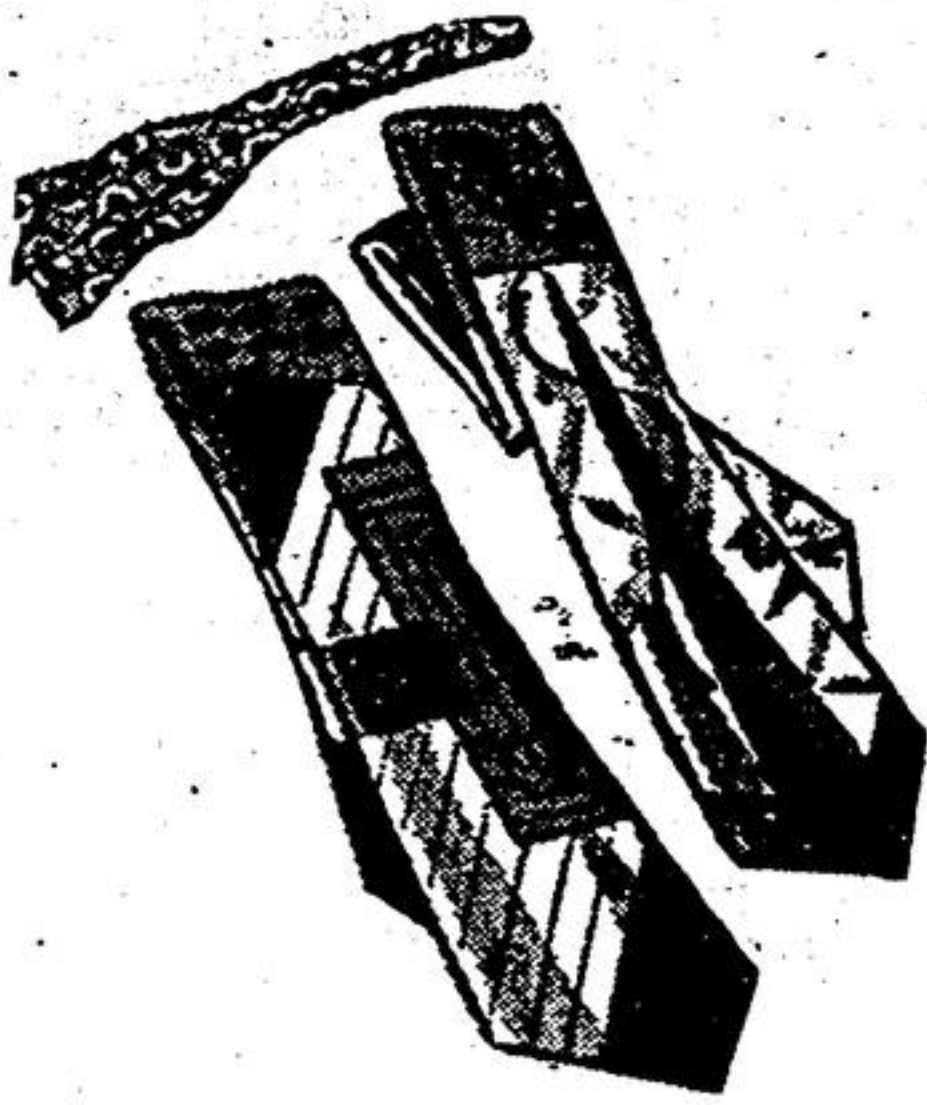
No persons, owner or otherwise,

would be permitted to cut trees under six inches in circumference four feet from the ground. Certain reservations from this regulations are provided for where a farmer might want to clear land for building structure, to make a right of way, etc. The bylaw is aimed at cutting for firewood what might be useful timber, adding to the wooded areas tree conservation.

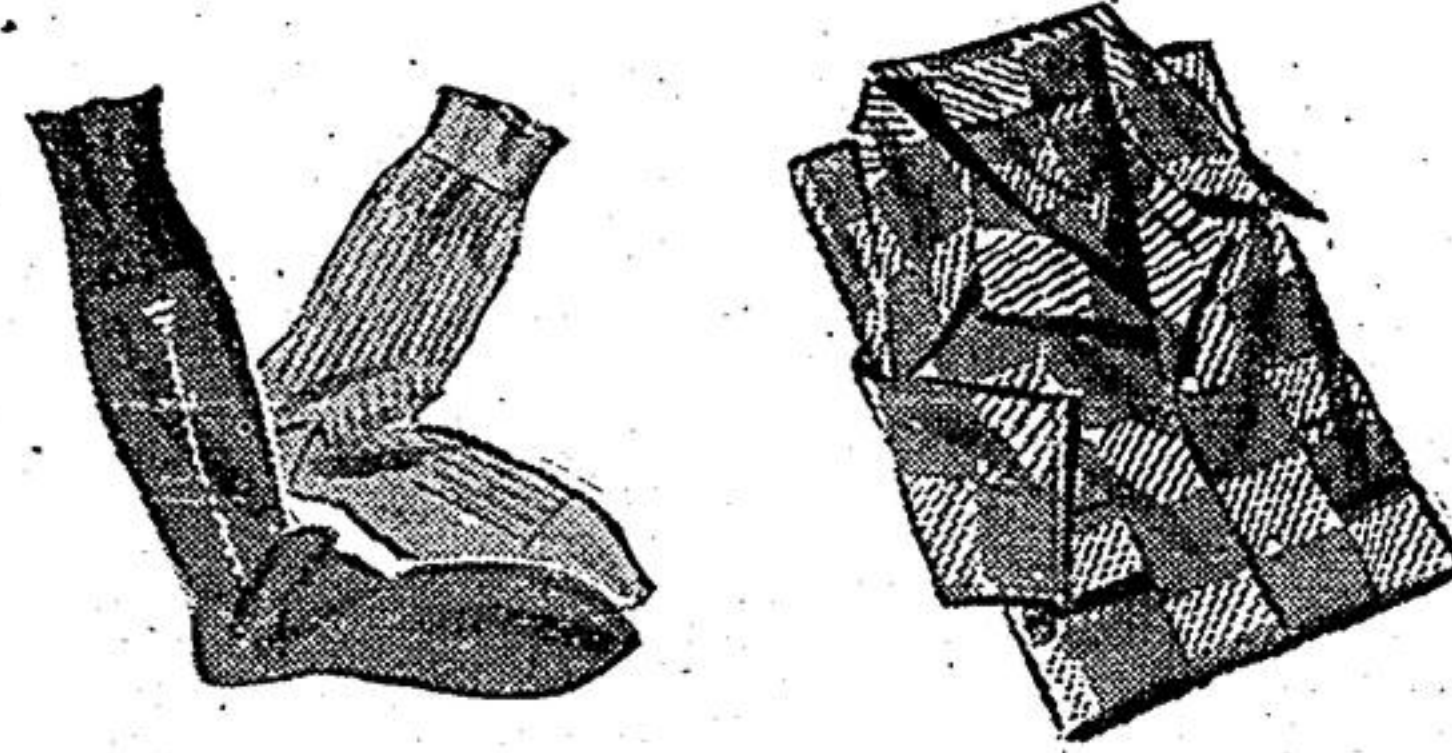
Engagements

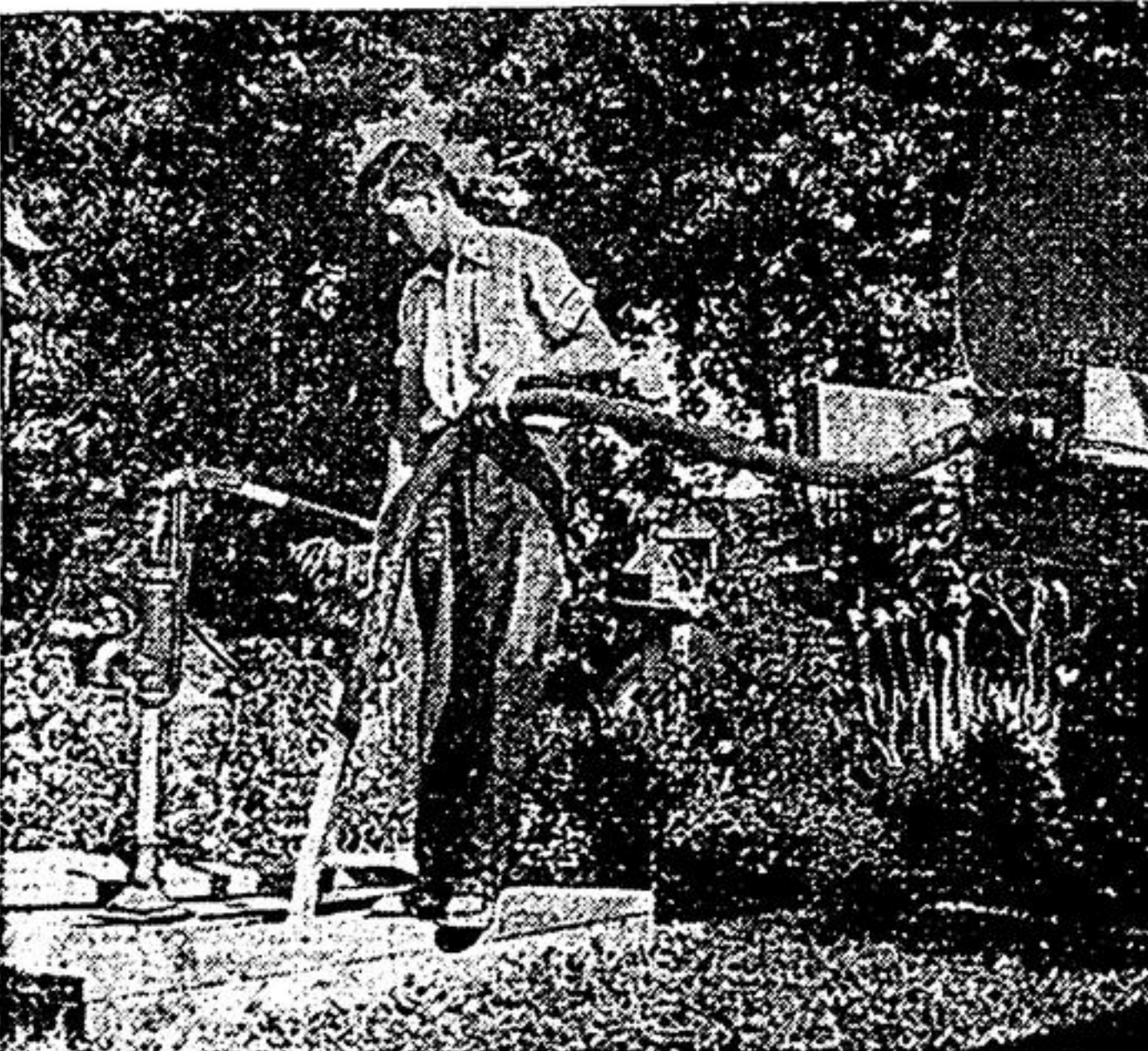
The Goodwood United Church Sunday School are holding their annual strawberry festival on Sept. 29th when the play "Charley Begins," will be given by the Newmarket Young People.
