### Liquor Mixed Up With One-Fifth Road Deaths

Cold-blooded engineering facts show that drunken drivers and drunken pedestrians are two of the gravest problems facing this country today, said provincial analyst Joslyn Rogers of Toronto before a Western Ontario audience last Thursday. He addressed the North Waterloo Medical Association.

In one week recently he said there were nine deaths directly due to alcohol in the province, probably a larger figure than the number of deaths from murder for the year to date.

Professor Rogers said the papers put up a great noise if there are two or three major crimes unsolved in a year. But the knowledge of half a dozen people killed in a week by intoxicated drivers apparently fails to arouse concern.

Professor Rogers made it plain he is not a prohibition advocate. "Just because some folks drown themselves in Lake Ontario doesn't say we can dry the lake up," he said.

But he believed something must be done to wake people up to the menace of alcohol mixed with traffic.

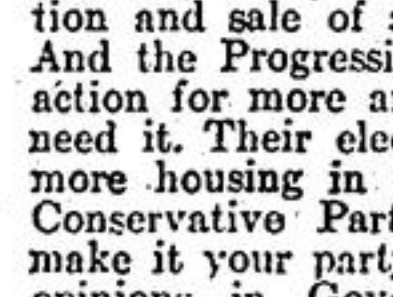

"Three water trucks last week were making three trips an hour hauling water into Agincourt, two of them working 18 hours a day and the other eight hours a day," Roy Shadlock, Village Trustee, said the situation was grim. "One of the hardest hit sections of the Township is Agincourt Police Village and the surrounding area," he said. "It is estimated that 105,600 gal-

lons of water are being delivered daily to Agincourt and its immediate area" he said.

Mr. Shadlock told Council last Monday night "Agincourt is definitely interested in water mains, the water shortage is serious."

The water shortage is also being felt through the remainder of Scarborough Township. The Utilities has imposed restrictions on the use of water for watering lawns and gardens.
