**Warned Against Two U.S. Firms**

R. B. Whitehead, K.C. of Toronto, Provincial Supt. of Insurance warns that there are two companies transacting insurance business in Ontario which are not licensed under the Insurance Act to do so. They are the American Farmers Insurance Company and the Bankers National Insurance Company both of Phoenix, Arizona.

He adds that representatives of these companies are known as "membership counsellors" and material furnished by the companies to such representatives includes applications for life and accident and sickness insurance.

Any person using or attempting to use such forms in the sale of insurance would be acting as an insurance agent within the meaning of the Insurance Act and would be contravening the provisions of the Act, so as to render themselves liable to prosecution.

**SELDOM SEEN**

There must be a china tea pot in your home. If not, then you will remember your mother's. It was a fancy china one, that ten chances to one she received as a shower gift. It was perched on the sideboard in the dining-room, to serve both a decorative and a useful purpose. It was the family bank.

When mother sold her chickens or the geese, or when the weekly cream and egg money came she donned her spectacles and counted it. Then with a stub of a pencil fished among the contents of the top drawer in the sideboard, she figured it up just to see that the man hadn't made any mistakes. For a few minutes there would be some laborious figuring, and then satisfied that all was well, the pencil would be replaced from where it was taken. The silver would be carefully wrapped up in the bills, and all would be placed in the china tea pot.

That tea pot certainly occupied a prominent place in our lives. It was the clearing house for mother's currency. When we wanted pennies for those big bullseye candies on our infrequent trips to the village, mother would dole out one apiece from her bank. Then while father was hitching up the horses she would make out a list of what to get at the store..... tea, sugar, spices, laces..... and so on, and all would be neatly totalled up with the correct amount of money and an extra ten cents in case the head of the household didn't have change for a plug of tobacco.

Along about tax time the china tea pot was often dumped out on the kitchen table at night when we were doing our homework. Father kept adding a few dollars from here and there.... from the jags of wood that he sold in the village, and the potatoes and apples.... and it was carefully totalled up. Tax time was coming mighty close and they were still short, and we in our childish way would begin to worry as to what might happen if we couldn't pay our taxes.

But somehow, mother and the china tea-pot always managed it. There was sort of a triumphant smile on her face when she dumped the contents out on the table on tax day and the amount was counted out in everything from ten dollar bills to pennies.

"Well, Paw, we made it," she would exclaim and he would ruffle up her hair, the way she pretended she didn't like, and he would kiss her on the cheek, and we would all go to school feeling quite important because there was enough to pay the taxes.

There were lean times for the china tea pot too. Times when mother would have to scrape mighty hard to make up enough for the groceries, and when father would say: "Shucks, Maw, never mind the plug of tobacco, I can do without it." But she would chase him along and smile and say that a hard working man was entitled to one bad habit.

The china tea pot became scarred from handling, too. I never knew a cup of tea to be made in it, but the corner clipped off the lid and the flowers on the side became just a wee bit tarnished, but it still occupied a prominent place.

**History of the Cabbage Traced Back 400 Years**

It can be traced back 4,000 years without the slightest effort. Once it was quite a luxury item, confined to a short growing season, but in today's modern world of speedy transportation and effective storage, it is a year-round vegetable.

Added to its economy is the fact that an ordinary head of cabbage, properly prepared, can supply your family with an amazing number of health-giving ingredients. It is filled with vitamins—especially Vitamin C—as well as plenty of minerals and lots of satisfying flavour.

In the actual cooking it is well to remember that low heat and long cooking which breaks down the sulphur compounds in cabbage, is responsible for the strong flavour and odor. This common objection is easy to avoid. Simply quarter or shred the head of cabbage and drop it into rapidly boiling, salted water and allow it to cook for approximately 10 or 12 minutes. You will not only save all the vitamins and minerals by this method, but the flavour will be that of a very special vegetable which all the family will enjoy.

It can be served with the good old favorites such as ham hocks, corn beef or salt pork; or serve it with cheese sauce or a devilled sauce. Just add a little prepared mustard, a drop of Worcestershire sauce, salt, pepper and cayenne to melted butter and pour over the boiled cabbage.

Have you served pan-steamed cabbage lately? It's easy to prepare. Melt two tablespoons of butter or bacon drippings in a skillet, add shredded cabbage, salt slightly and cover tightly. Cook about 12 minutes, stirring occasionally.

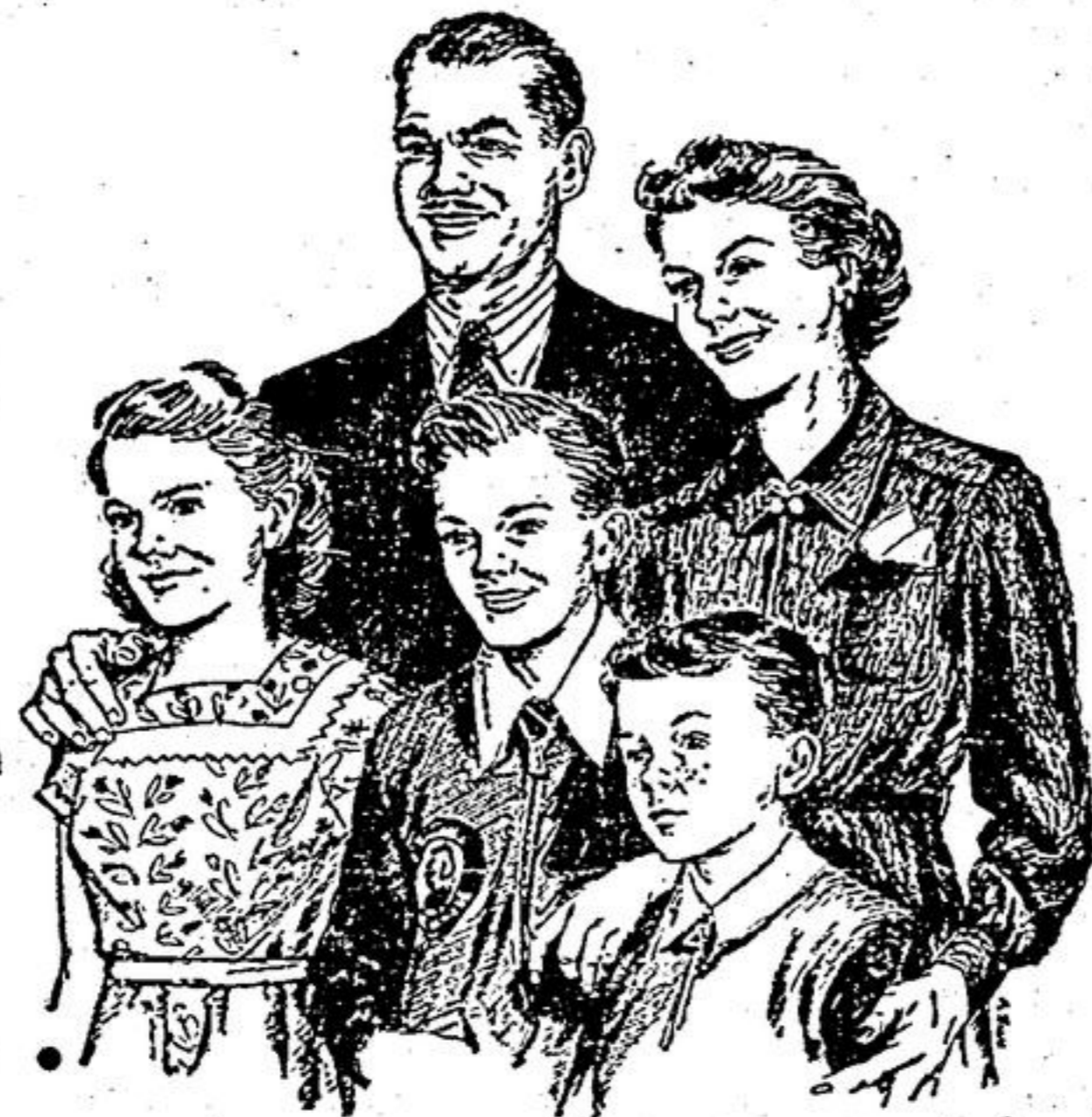
