Then in 1920 the Presbyterian and Methodist congregationss in Claremont united and they decided to worship in the Methodist church building.

In 1925 the United Church of Canada came into being and the United Congregation here became a charge of the United Church of Canada. Last year the church building underwent major repairs and changes, as well as redecoration, and this year the church celebrates its Diamond Jubilee or 60th anniversary.

Ten years ago, following the Fiftieth anniversary, the present pastor, Rev. I. E. Kennedy, B.A., B.D., came to Claremont United Church as the minister. He leaves on June 30th to take up the duties of the Cannington pastoral charge in the Lindsay Presbytery, and his congregation and others who have come to know Mr. Kennedy are extremely sorry to think that he is going to leave this community that he has come to know so well.

The change in pastorate will undoubtedly make necessary refurnishing the Manse, either wholly or in part. Certain repairs are also needed to the house, and as all this additional expenditure, along with a substantial increase in salary to the minister must be met, it means that every contributor should substantially increase giving from week to week.
