Site Is Sought for Hockey Hall

The International Hockey Hall of Fame will ask the Kingston city council to provide a site near the junction of Stuart and Barrie streets, in the city park, as a site for the new Hockey Hall of Fame to be erected in Kingston.

Until a few weeks ago the committee had planned to build a shrine at the Fair Grounds, beside the proposed memorial centre. However, a visit from Clarence Campbell, National Hockey League president, chairman of the Hall's board of directors, has resulted in a suggested change of site.

The NHL has promised \$30,000 towards the building costs once it is certain a suitable site and design are chosen. At present there is about \$56,000 in the building fund.

Stouffville bounced back into a first place tie with Port Perry on Monday night, by virtue of a 6-1 win over the Scugog nine in Memorial Park here. Lanky Hocus Miller must be credited with a big share of the winning honours.

The hefty right hander uncorked a variety of sizzling curves that had the majority of Port batters badly baffled. Not a Port Perry batter reached first base in the second, third or fourth innings. Miller struck out eleven, and held the visitors to two scratch hits. Bill Harper who was a real stumbler to Stouffville batters in the game at Port Perry, was again on the hill for the visitors, sat Stouffville down hitless in the third and fourth round.

Bob Hassard, playing his usual smooth game at the hot corner for Stouffville, tripled his first time up in the first innings, and was followed by Miller with a third base liner to account for three runs. Hassard's drive went three hundred feet into left centre. This distance was duplicated by Minton later in the game, when he sailed a high one 300 ft. into centre. Both blows could have been homers in Maple Leaf stadium.

Port scored their lone tally in the fifth, when Harper singled. Cam Aldred gave a local touch to the visiting lineup. Cam played in left field and made several nice catches. Brother Doug, also a Stouffvilleite was in the stands.

Fans were pleased to see "Butch" Schell back in the local lineup. Pressure of business has kept the former Stouffville catcher from participating in the game so far.

More than three hundred fans were on hand for the game. Stouffville will play in Sutton this Thursday night, and at Bolsover on Monday. The next home game will be July 4th, when Sunderland are the visitors.

Bogus U.S. Bills Now Circulating in Canada

Ottawa, June 17—The post office warned postmasters that counterfeit United States \$100 Federal Reserve notes "of excellent workmanship" are in circulation.

They belong to series 1934 of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York and appeared in February and Counterfeits of series 1934A and 1934 from the Federal Reserve Banks of New York and Atlanta are also in circulation. The post office says they are "extremely deceptive."

In 1934 series of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York the Benjamin Franklin portrait shows mere traces of counterfeiture.

On the band of these notes the tip of the spire on Independence Hall is slightly misplaced and is to the left of a tiny white opening into which it was intended to fit.

The Franklin portrait in the Federal Reserve Bank of New York 1934A and Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta 1934 series is lighter than genuine and of a grayish monotone. The counterfeits show a puff of hair below an exposed ear lighter than genuine and the extreme right of the bill appears darker than the genuine.

Give \$17,450 Damages In Action Arising Out of Blackburn Fatality

Damages of \$17,450 was awarded Mrs. Pulia Blackburn of Oshawa, on Friday in non-jury sittings of the Ontario Supreme Court, in Whitby by Mr. Justice Dalton A. Wells of Toronto. Defendant was Brampton George Hawkins, who formerly lived in Oshawa and now resides in Belleville.

The action arose out of an accident which occurred at the intersection of Ritson Road and King Street in Oshawa on the evening of May 10, 1948, in which Peter Allen Blackburn, Mrs. Blackburn's husband and Treasurer of the City of Oshawa, was struck by Hawkins' automobile. A short time following the impact Mr. Blackburn died in the Oshawa General Hospital from shock and multiple injuries which included two broken legs.

Defendant Admits Liability

The action which began last week was expected to be the major item on a docket which included 19 divorce cases, all but one of them uncontested and only the one damage suit. However, Mr. Thompson, of the firm Hughes, Agar and Thompson, which acted for the defendant, interrupted the introductory remarks of T. K. Creighton, K.C. of the Oshawa legal firm of Grierson, Creighton and Fraser, who acted for the plaintiff, to admit liability for his client. The admission made introduction of evidence regarding the actual accident unnecessary. All that then was needed was an assessment of damages to be awarded Mrs. Blackburn.

It was established that Mrs. Blackburn was executrix of her husband's estate and that the only beneficiaries would be herself and a daughter, Millicent, 25, who is employed as a clerk in a local bank. Mrs. Blackburn said that her husband was born in Eldersley, Scotland, on January 25, 1884. At the time of his death he had been City Treasurer of Oshawa for 25 years. Prior to that he acted as City Treasurer of Sarnia.

Financial Status Probed

In order to establish the mode of life Mr. Blackburn and his family lived at the time of his death and the way in which they might reasonably have expected to continue living had he not been stricken, it

was necessary for both Mr. Creighton and his assistant Neil C. Fraser, K.C., and Mr. Thompson, defendant's attorney, to question Mrs. Blackburn extensively on the financial status of her family both before her husband's death and since. Mr. Blackburn's salary was set at \$409.50 a month by his wife. She said, among other things that she was maintaining the family home at 313 King Street East and that it had been necessary for her to take employment. Throughout his life, Mrs. Blackburn said, her husband was a generous contributor to both charities and the church he attended. She thought that at


times he gave more than he could afford.

Following the accident, more than a year ago, Mr. Hawkins was charged with manslaughter. He was released on bail of \$3,000 until a preliminary hearing into the charge could be held. Final disposition of the charge was a conviction and a jail sentence of several months.
