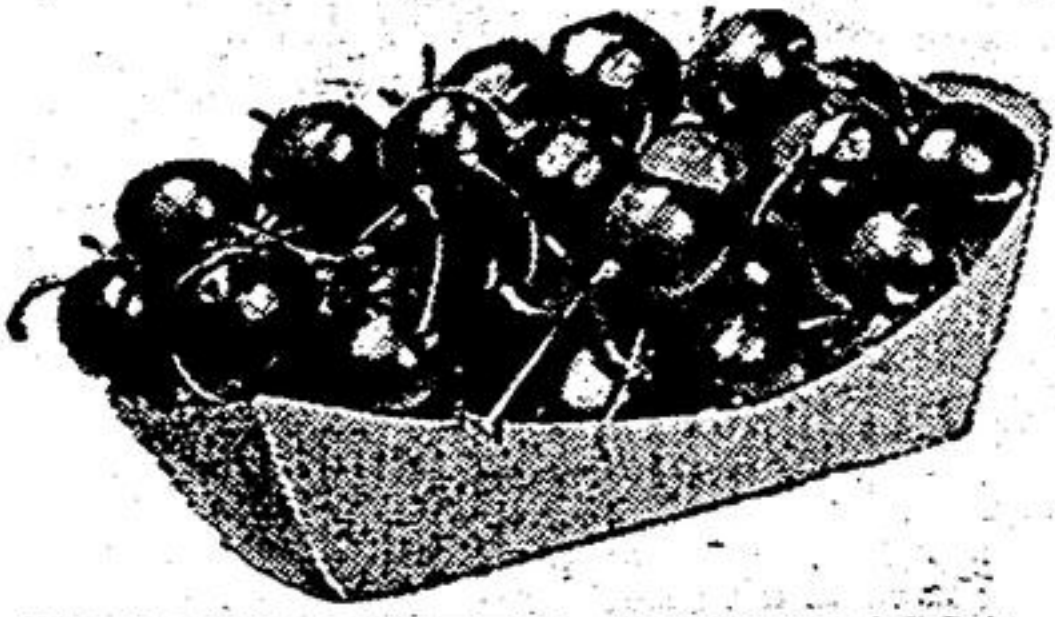


CHERRIES!
