## Intermediates Must Win Friday Night to Stay in Tri-County League Playoffs

Stouffville has an all-important game coming up this Friday night, as they must win to stay in the Tri-County Intermediate baseball playoffs. Sunderland defeated Sutton on Monday night to leave Stouffville and Bolsover in a three-way tie for third and fourth position.

The issue will be decided thus: Bolsover and Sutton will meet in a sudden death game this Wednesday night, the winner to take over third position. Stouffville meanwhile stands by to meet the loser of this game to decide the last playoff position. Stouffville will play this game with either Bolsover or Sutton this Friday night at Sunderland.

Port Perry finished atop the local Tri-County Intermediate group, with a four-way tie for second place, and Beaverton in the cellar position.

Sunderland pulled into second on Thursday night with a 9-8 win over Stouffville. The game had previously ended in a draw when it was played way back on June 2nd. Arrangements were made to settle the standing in playoff spots early this week. Playoffs in each group will be semi-finals and finals, four teams; first and second, and third and fourth, each to play two-out-of-three. Group winners will then meet in the same manner.

In the game played at Sunderland on Thursday night, Stouffville went into the last of the 7th inning Sunderland scored two runs. Louis Miller was on the mound for the locals and dished up seven hits. His team-mates failed to slip him out of his trouble however by committing eleven errors and four hits.

Nick Prochenko is still out of the lineup with an injured finger. He'll be back on duty for the playoffs.

**Maple Leaf Try-Out Camps**

The Toronto Maple Leaf Baseball Club of the International League in conjunction with the Philadelphia Phillies of the National League inaugurated their try-out camps at City Sports Park, St. Catharines on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, July 11th, 12th, and 13th. City Sports Park is located at Merritt and Thomas streets in St. Catharines and is owned by the surrounding district interested in Professional Baseball.

All prospective ball players from the ages of 17 to 22 and boys who have graduated from High School are eligible for this combined Toronto-Philadelphia try-out camp. All boys desirous of playing professional baseball. Mr. Cy Morgan, Philadelphia's Chief Scout in charge of try-out camps will conduct the daily activities and he will be ably assisted by several well-known Philadelphia scouts and executives.

Morgan's camp will move to Toronto on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, July 14th, 15th, and 16th. The Memorial Stadium (Viaduct Park) will be the site of the camp on Thursday, July 14th. The park is located at the intersection of Broadview Avenue where Danforth Avenue meets Bloor Street. On Friday, July 15th, the camp moves to St. Clair Stadium (Earlsfort Park) on St. Clair Avenue Lansdowne Avenue. The final try-out activities will be conducted Saturday, July 16th, at Maple Leaf Stadium, the home of the Toronto Maple Leafs. The camp runs daily at 11.00 a.m. each morning and continues until 4 p.m. Boys attending the try-out camps are asked to bring their own equipment, such as uniforms, shoes and caps.

Bob has been a real asset to the Stouffville Intermediates, with whom he has played ball all season.

The purchase of the tables was made possible by a legacy left to the park by the will of the late Mrs. Jas. McCullough. This week the tables were treated to a special type varnish paint which gives them a nice rustic appearance in addition to protecting them against the weather.

Dashing into a blazing summer kitchen, Loring Doolittle, 21, of Aurora, aided by an unidentified taxi driver, dragged his unconscious father, Clarence Doolittle, to safety Thursday. The father had entered the burning kitchen minutes before to save his two spaniel dogs.

Aurora firemen, under Chief Harry Jones, who arrived on the scene as Doolittle was carried out, revived him with an inhalator.

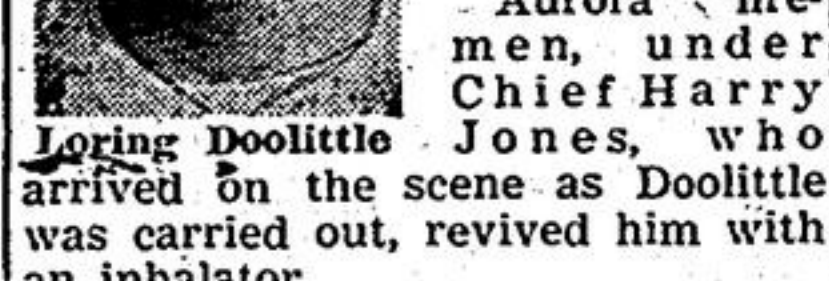
Doolittle was overcome by smoke after he handed the two dogs to his son, who had also braved the flames to save the dogs. "I found the dogs, but was too weak to carry them out," the elder Doolittle told the press.

When his father failed to come out behind him, Loring and the taxi driver, who happened to be passing by, went back and found him lying near the door.

Mr. and Mrs. Doolittle awoke about 4 a.m. and saw a glow outside. They thought it was a neighbor's house—and Mr. Doolittle went out to ring the fire alarm. Once outside he saw the fire was in his own house.

Rushing back into the house, he warned Mrs. Doolittle, who ran to awaken her two small sons, Karry, two, and Claire, seven, while he aroused Loring. When all of the family were outside they remembered the two dogs. Loring Doolittle is well known in local sporting circles.

Firemen confined the blaze to the rear of the house. Damage is estimated at \$1,500.

## Uxbridge Couple Hold Unique Record 50 Years

Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Willis, Uxbridge, celebrated 50 years of wedded life last week. Mrs. Willis, the former Elizabeth Jane Hughes born at Dunkerron, near Schomberg, wore the 84-year-old wedding dress worn by her late mother, Mrs. Samuel Campbell. They were married at the home of the bride's parents on their farm at Dunkerron by the Rev. James R. Fraser, Presbyterian minister at Uxbridge at that time. Following a honeymoon at Muskoka, they settled at Uxbridge where the groom was born and educated. He was then a promising druggist at Uxbridge. He entered the employ of McGillivray's drug store 66 years ago and upon completion of his professional education some years later purchased the business which remained in the same location on the main street of Uxbridge. Mr. Willis who is 80, is still in business and with him is his son Byron, druggist in charge and his grandson Russell Willis, apprenticing for the profession.

It was when Elizabeth Hughes went to Uxbridge to teach in the public school that the couple met. She boarded in the Willis home and was a very distant relative of her future mother-in-law who was also a Hughes before her marriage. She is now 81 and like her husband, is extremely active. Mr. Willis has been a member of Chalmer's Presbyterian choir for more than 50 continuous years and a member of the session for over 40 years. He is the Sunday School superintendent, a position he began about 35 years ago. He is an ardent bowler and has followed lawn tennis all his life. Mrs. Willis, a person of many talents began the first china painting studio in the town years ago, firing her own pieces, in a home kiln. She has gained a wide reputation in this art which she follows presently. She is a charter member of the local Red Cross Branch; a charter member of the Hypatia Literary Club and a life member of the Presbyterian W.M.S. and its present assistant secretary.
