### SOFTENING UP THE STRONG

An article in the May issue of Reader's Digest has led us to do some thinking on the subject of government grants and bonuses. The story in question was written by an ex-serviceman, who has come to the conclusion that the juicy benefits handed out to all veterans, regardless of physical condition, are a detriment rather than an aid to successful living and we believe he is right.

It seems that all governments today, including those in our own land have come to the conclusion that they must rush into "social" legislation. In plain English this means arranging for handouts to the public in one form or another, and all too often the gifts are sugar-coated and timed so skillfully that they amount to little short of bribes. If one party starts into this game the rest are bound to follow and the result is going to be the costliest race in the world's political history.

Thank goodness the bad old days of complete indifference to human suffering have largely disappeared. We certainly do need government assistance for the very poor, the unhealthy and the aged. The laws which provided for aid to the helpless are but practical application of the Christianity which we profess. But there is something which is more than faintly disgusting about the whole sale government handout, to either individuals, municipalities or organizations, as long as they are healthy enough to make their own way in the world.

The chief strength of our young nation has always lain in its sturdy sense of independence and its willingness to work out its own problems the hard way. If the present rash of gratuities continues Canadians are likely to become so completely softened up that they will forget how to stand on their own feet in time of emergency.
