**THE MIXING BOWL**

Hello Homemakers! We certainly hope that the drought has not affected the fish and that they are thriving better than our vegetables. Fish cannot take the place of vegetables but it can frequently be served in place of our expensive meats.

There is a surprising variety of fish available. Considering the many restaurants which have specialized in fish dishes, it is amazing that the homemaker has not copied more of their methods of cooking, serving and garnishing. Perhaps it is because fish is not very pleasant to handle and often leaves a strong odour. After handling fish, wash hands in strong salt water, rinse and then wash with soap. Also there are air-deodorizers available which help to keep the air sweet throughout the cooking period.

Do not be dismayed by the thought of having to serve fish leftovers for there are so many appetizing ways in which they can be served. Flake the cooked fish and store in a covered jar in the refrigerator ready to use in fish loaves, souffles, cream sauce or salad mixtures.

Baked Stuffed Haddock  
2 pounds haddock fillets  
2 tbsps. lemon juice  
salt and pepper  
paprika  
Dressing: 4 tbsps. fat; ¼ cup

chopped onion, 1 cup chopped celery; 2 tbsps. chopped parsley; 1 tsp. poultry dressing; 3 cups dry bread crumbs; salt and pepper; hot water to moisten.

Simmer the onion and celery in melted fat for 10 minutes. Add seasonings, bread crumbs and enough hot water to moisten. Mix lightly. Spread dressing over fish (placed on baking foil in casserole) and sprinkle with paprika. Bake in electric oven at 375 degs. for 30 mins.

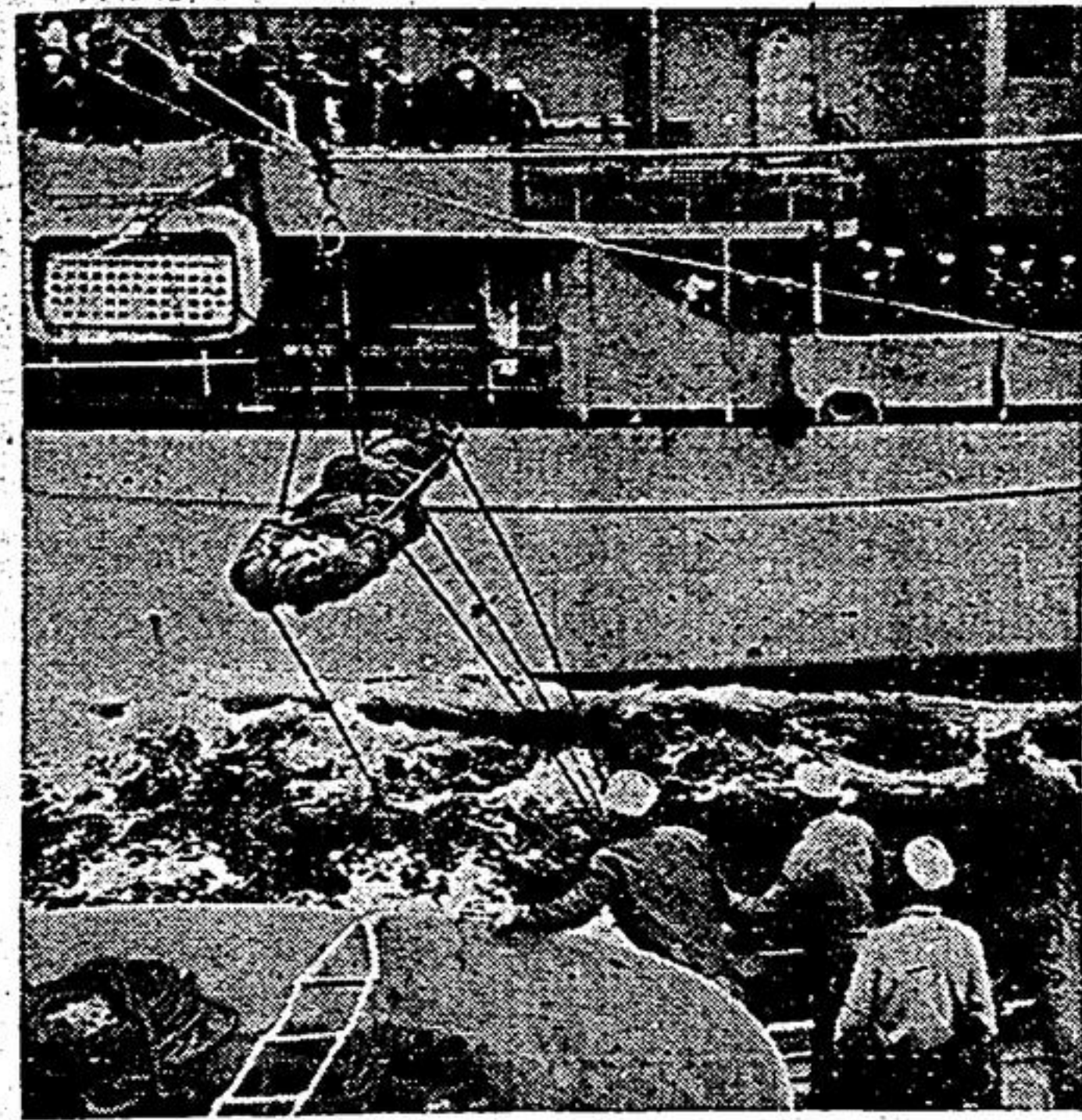
**Tartar Sauce**  
1 cup mayonnaise  
½ tsp. scraped onion  
2 tbsps. pickle relish  
1 tsp. chopped parsley  
Combine ingredients and chill well. Serves six.

**Hot Salmon Sandwiches**  
1 cup flaked, cooked or canned salmon  
one-third cup chopped celery  
few grains pepper  
¼ cup mayonnaise or salad dressing  
3 tbsps. sweet pickle relish  
8 slices bread  
1 egg  
two-thirds cup milk  
2 tbsps. butter or margarine  
Combine salmon, celery, pepper, mayonnaise or salad dressing and relish. Spread on 4 bread slices; cover with remaining slices. Beat egg; add milk. Pour 1 tbsps. over each side of each sandwich. Brown on both sides in margarine. Serve hot.

**Broiled Trout or Whitefish**  
Use whole fish weighing 2 lbs. Have head and tail removed and fish split and cleaned. Place, skin side down, on greased broiler with top of food 2" below broiler unit. Sprinkle with salt and pepper; brush with melted fat or salad oil. Broil 10 min. or until brown. Carefully turn; sprinkle with salt and pepper; brush with melted fat or salad oil; Broil 5 minutes or until skin is crisp and brown. If desired, serve with Lemon Butter. Serves four.

**SIX-FOOT TICKET FOR 8500-MILE TRIP**  
Montreal, July 30 — A ticket measuring six feet in length was in the purse of Miss Tillie Standish, of Vancouver, when she arrived here recently by the Canadian National Railway's "Continental Limited" on a 8500-mile trip around North America on 25 railways and a steamship. Railway officials commented that the issuance of this type of ticket requires the skill of an experienced passenger agent. Miss Standish's itinerary called for brief stopovers enroute, including Toronto, Montreal, Boston, New York and Washington.

**Massey-Harris Fired Red; 4,500 Strike**

A wildcat strike by 4,500 workers at Toronto's big Massey-Harris plant last week again demonstrated forcibly the swiftness and effectiveness of the Communist union machine.

Tuesday forenoon, Steve Anco, Communist president of the CIO Auto Workers' local in the plant was fired. A few hours later, 4,500 employees walked off the job. They had swallowed Anco's story that he was let out for trying to forestall a layoff of 1,000.

Management's version was quite different. The night before Anco had interfered with plant operations. He stopped four men from working an emergency overtime shift to help pack combines for shipment out West in time for the harvest.

Anco's argument was that no one should be asked to work overtime, not even in an emergency, when men were being laid off. (Over 500 have been laid off so far this summer).

In view of Anco's political leanings, this looked like a thin excuse but it was good enough to strike the plant. Besides being union president, Anco has long been active in Labor-Progressive and Communist party affairs.

Behind the reductions was choosier buying by milady. Immediately, this was reflected all down the line in harder bargains. Prices at auctions last winter and this spring showed the trend; off anywhere from 15% to 25%. High-quality furs showed a sharper drop still.

Today's lower retail prices are a direct reflection of these fur reductions. Thus, no further retail cuts are looked for, since present prices reflect the full amount of lower raw fur prices, and labor costs are still high — above last year in most cases.

But despite this hard-and-fast cost situation, the industry was just a bit jittery this week as the fur-selling season got under way. It was still too early to get Miss and Mrs. Canada's reaction to 1949-50 fur values.

**Horse Cruelty Case Written Off by S.P.C.A.**

The Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals yesterday closed its books on the alleged "death march" of horses. Northern Ontario last spring termed the incident "an unfortunate experience."

Romeo Tessier of Sudbury, owner of the horses, was acquitted last month of cruelty charges involving the use of horses in logging operations near Thessalon, 48 miles southeast of Sault Ste. Marie. Evidence showed he had rented horses to a Quebec concern operating in Ontario.

S.P.C.A. Inspector C. W. Morrison who investigated the incident, said in a statement yesterday that "there is no doubt from the evidence submitted that the horses deteriorated" between January and April in logging operations between Rocky Island Lake and Thessalon. He said this was due to "negligence on the part of the Quebec company of the gross type."

"Successful prosecution of malefactors at this time is an impossibility," his report stated. "Although 181 horses were used in the logging operations, only were in the alleged 'death march' he said. A number of the horses died and several more were disposed of."

**FARMER KILLED BY LIGHTNING**

Russel McNab, 51-year-old Kenmore farmer, was killed Wednesday night when lightning struck an iron gate on his farm while was closing the gate during brief electrical storm. Kenmore is 15 miles south of Ottawa.
