## AIR PROTESTS ON BUILDING BYLAW

Brougham, Aug. 25—Residents of Pickering Township will have a chance to voice objections to a recently-passed bylaw prohibiting building of one-story dwelling of less than 700 square feet floor space, when the municipal board meet here Sept. 9.

Township Clerk Lloyd T. Johnston announced the hearing will be held in the municipal building. The bylaw was passed June 7, listing almost a dozen restrictions to regulate building of homes, summer cottages, tourist cabins garages in the township.

In future, all houses and summer cottages of more than one story are required to have a ground floor area of 600 square feet or more.

Under the by-law, summer cottages or cabins may not be converted or used for living accommodation unless they conform to specified requirements. Trailer camps and overnight cabins are not permitted.

In all new sub-divisions where no public water or piped water supply approved by the medical officer of health is available the minimum area of each lot has been set at 15,000 square feet. Where the municipality approves of the water system, the minimum area of the lot may be reduced to 7,500 square feet.

The restrictions do not apply to buildings erected prior to June 7, or approved by the building inspector previous to passing of the bylaw.
