Routine Business at Early Council Meeting

Pickering Township Council, meeting on Thursday, Sept. 1st, due to their regular meeting date falling on the holiday, dealt with only routine business.

A petition was received from ratepayers in the Dunbarton area calling for action by the council regarding the Burt Dog Boarding Kennel. Owing to the fact that a number of complaints have been received regarding the dogs there, no kennel license was issued Mr. Burt for 1949. At the August meeting council gave the owner thirty days to remove the alleged nuisance.

"I think we should give him more time," said Reeve Westney. "That's where we differ," returned Councillor Geo. Todd. "I don't either," said Deputy-Reeve Disney, "dogs can be an awful nuisance—they should never have been allowed in there in the first place."

It was finally agreed that council should stand by their previous decision to have the dogs removed forthwith.

Sidney Pugh, lot 26, con. 4, was granted payment of \$30 for three lambs, two ewes, 1 ram, all pure-bred Shropshires, injured by dogs.

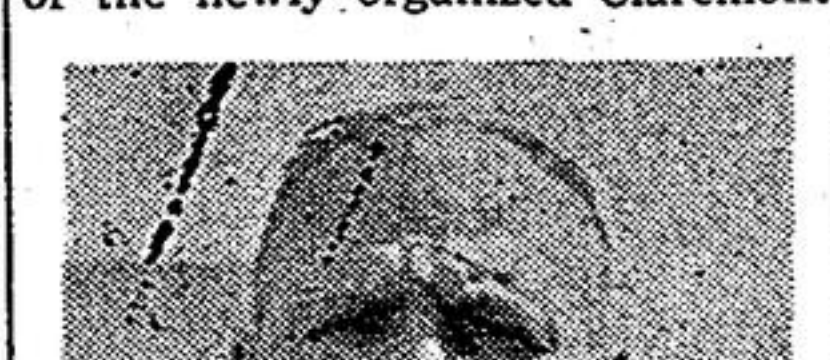
Road accounts passed for payment amounted to \$7,682.32. This amount included \$3,033.85 for asphalt top and road work done on the Bay road.

A petition was tabled from Dixie road residents, asking for the brush to be cut, road ditched and gravelled where necessary. Since the budget was set and much of it already spent for this year nothing could be done on the road until 1950, council agreed.

Whether or not Claremont is to have a new fire truck is being seriously discussed by the village trustees and members of the local brigade. At the present time, \$1,500 in new equipment has been ordered, and is now ready for shipment, to be installed on the present truck.

The existing outfit is ten years old, and was a home-made affair, Geo. Constable, brigade representative, when speaking to council last week on the matter, doubted if the government would pay a subsidy on such a truck, should the municipality take over all township fire outfits.

It seems too bad to spend \$1,500 for equipment for an outdated truck if a new modern outfit will be needed within a year or two. Should the village trustees choose to go ahead and purchase a new outfit, costing \$6,000 or \$7,000, on their own, no government help would be forthcoming, and the way matters stand the township council is not prepared to enter the fire-fighting field at the moment. Considerable planning will be necessary before a satisfactory zoning for the entire township could be set up for the three brigades of Claremont, Brougham and Pickering. At the present time, the southwest corner of the township is in dire need of more protection, and Pickering is overtaxed and cannot hope to service this fast-growing area.

Auctioneer Farmer said he had to use real salesmanship all afternoon, and sold steadily for four hours. It is reported that the Kahns would be interested in buying a larger farm in the Stouffville district. No implements were advertised or offered for sale.
