



Mennonites Prepare **Europe Yule Parcels**

A new warehouse has been acquired in Kitchener by the Mennonite central committee.

The red brick two-storey building is a stone's throw from the former upstairs quarters and is located at the rear of the Mennonite book store on King St. Prime reason for the new ware-

house is the easier access to traffic for outgoing and incoming articles. Slightly smaller than the previous building, it is crowded almost to capacity with Christmas parcels which will shortly be shipped to Europe.

During the last few weeks more than 1,800 bundles were received from all points of Canada.

This marks the third year parcels are being sent to the destitute children of Europe.

This year they will be directed largely to relief posts in Germany since access to Poland, Yugoslavia and other countries is barred by the Reds.

Urging the workers on to greater efforts in the project are letters such as this, received after the distribution of packages last year: "My but I was a fortunate child, and I will never in my whole life forget the beautiful Christmas of 1948. Thank you a thousand times."

Wrapped in striped towels the parcels include such articles as wearing apparel, handkerchiefs, writing paper, soap, combs, sweaters, underwear, toilet articles. Each bundle has one toy.

Many of the parcels have been made up by Sunday School classes, Bible schools, clubs and families. Christmas greetings and self

addressed envelopes are enclosed. Supervising the packing of the parcels is Miss Clara Snyder. Assisting her is Miss Elva Snyder and a number of voluntary workers
