Half Million Dollar High School for Pickering Township

Pickering Township Council on Thursday gave first and second readings to a by-law which provides up to \$466,000 for a new high school to serve the Pickering District High School area. The site selected is in the village of Pickering immediately north of the community park and an agreement to purchase 12 acres was made some time ago at a price of \$12,000. Just how many rooms the school will have is not known since no architect has yet been employed and no definite plans are in existence.

The Pickering Township Board is taking something of a new departure in its approach to this building. They are utilizing a booklet of instruction issued by the Ontario Department of Education which is said to be a complete guide to Boards who wish to build schools without running into unfortunate snags. The booklet sets out tentative prices per square foot on various kinds of construction. Plans are then drawn up and submitted for approval and then the plans and the by-law are sent on to the Municipal Board for final approval.

The township board was organized at first of this year after refusal by Pickering Township authorities to become part of the Whitby-Whitby township school area. Present need for a school in the township is pressing, as Whitby High School and other district high schools find themselves overcrowded and unable to accommodate any more pupils from the growing township of Pickering.

Last week the chairman of the Pickering Township Board refused to give out any information whatsoever for publication about this half-million dollar project.

Justice Disagrees With Jury

Judgment for \$2,000 was given George H. Baird, Reach Township farmer, following the court hearing of an action to recover damages for injuries he received when struck by a car at Thornhill on October 13, 1947. Defendant was Fred Broom of Richvale. A. W. S. Greer, K.C. represented Mr. Baird and M. J. Haffey was counsel for Mr. Broom.

The accident occurred when Mr. Baird was crossing Yonge Street on a holiday night. Finding no traffic coming from the south, he started across the wide road but when he arrived at the centre, was prevented from continuing. He stood in the centre about two minutes. Then a car coming from the south, driven by Mr. Broom struck him.

Finding of the jury was: (1) no negligence on the part of the driver; (2) find the plaintiff negligent; (3) after reaching the centre of the road the plaintiff did not give sufficient attention to traffic

coming from the south. Presiding, Hon. Justice Mackay found himself unable to agree with the verdict of the jury and ruled that no negligence in law was shown by the plaintiff. His Lordship: (after the jury had been asked to retire) "He wasn't required to look to the south—the cars coming from the south would be required to wait out for an individual on the road. Therefore there was no negligence. I find myself unable to arrive at a conclusion indicating negligence—so I must disregard the answer to (3) as not constituting negligence at all." Judgment was against the defendant for \$2,000 and costs.
