## Former Uxbridge-Goodwood Girl Feted at Palmerston

Miss Pearl Davey, daughter of the late Richard Davey, brother of Walter Davey, Toronto, and the late E. J. Davey of Stouffville, was given honorable recognition last week when she left the employ of the C.N.R. at Palmerston after long years of service.

Fellow railway workers seized the opportunity to express their high esteem of Miss Davey, and organized a pleasant presentation in her honor. At 3 o'clock one afternoon, they gathered at the Freight Office, and Mr. J. Fred Edwards, M.P.P. for Perth, and friend of Miss Davey's for many years, read a well worded address telling of the appreciation of employees for the opportunity of having worked with Miss Davey. These employees had contributed most generously to a fund, to be used as a farewell gift to their retiring work-mate.

Miss Davey's father first started on the railroad when he took employment at Uxbridge with the bridge gang, and rose to be road-master at Palmerston where his daughter was in his office during his time there. When Mr. Davey started in Uxbridge the round houses were located there. He later was moved to Lindsay, then to Palmerston, and with each move was given promotion. He passed away about three years ago after serving over 51 years with the railroad. His mother was a Stouffville girl, member of the Stewart family here long years ago.

In 1900, Miss Davey, as a very young girl, started work with the railway, employed in her late father's office. Mr. Davey held the position of Roadmaster. In 1910 she left the railway to become cashier and book-keeper in the store operated in Palmerston by the late George Howe. This employment held her interest until 1917, when she returned to the railway, being employed first in the station ticket office, and later in the Freight Sheds. The event on Tuesday of this week concluded thirty-two years of continuous employment in these capacities.

The address read to Miss Davey was as follows:  
Dear Miss Davey:—It is indeed a privilege to be present on this most auspicious occasion, and, as an old fellow-employee, to have a part in it.

A record of 42 years' service in the employ of the Company, is indeed one to be proud of, and your fellow-workers are happy to congratulate you of such an achievement.

This term of service began in the office of another faithful employee of the Company, your esteemed father, the late Richard Davey, who was at that time Roadmaster. Following this, you have spent 32 years in the Passenger and Freight Departments, and have seen this Company grow from the old Grand Truck Railway, operating only in Ontario, to the vast Canadian National Railway system, operating from Coast to Coast.

The loyal and efficient service which you have rendered over the years, has made no small contribution to the success of the work done in the Palmerston Division. Your faithful efforts during the past 42 years, have earned for you the most sincere appreciation from the Executive Officers, and on their behalf I express this appreciation to you. You have earned a high place in the esteem, not only of those with whom you have worked, but of the whole community for your sterling worth and character.

On behalf of your fellow workers I ask you to accept these flowers.

## Newmarket Physician Sells Practice Of 40 Years

**VIOLATES ACT**  
At Gravenhurst, Ont., July 8, George Kemp, Sundridge, Ont., was fined \$10 and costs for selling potatoes below the declared grade. This action was taken under the provisions of the Farm Products Grades and Sales Act of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

**BROKE DETENTION**

## Distinctive Customs Of Mennonites Fading Away

Writing from Winnipeg in a news despatch published in the Kitchener News-Record Dave Cross reports on the "odd customs of Mennonites" claiming that these characteristics are gradually being dropped, yet many of them we like very much. The Mennonites have been in this country for nearly 150 years not merely 75 years as the writer below infers. Cross' article reads as follows:

"Seventy-five years ago the first Mennonites came to Canada. Today, a great number have been absorbed into the Canadian way of life, although a few still cling to centuries-old customs.

About 115,000 strong in Canada with a large segment living in Manitoba, they are a striking contrast to other followers of the Protestant faith.

Origin of Beard Custom  
A highly religious sect, most of their customs are observances of Biblical phrases. One of these, adhered to closely by the extreme Baldwin sect, is that all male members must wear beards.

This idiosyncrasy springs from the belief that the beard was given by God and therefore should not be shaved. Another custom in extreme groups—there are 16 different sects—is that only married members must wear beards.

A Mennonite source said no feasible reason can be found for the strict rule among a few sects that no buttons be worn on clothes. He felt it possible they cling to the Mennonite expression "those who have hooks and eyes will be saved by the Lord." This is taken to mean cloth hooks should be used, not buttons.

Originated in Holland  
The Mennonites originated in Holland and Switzerland, moving to Prussia and then Russia, gradually shifting to new lands because of religious differences. About 5,000 Mennonites were included in displaced persons groups coming to Canada during the last two years.

In Mennonite communities, one family is in charge of all blacksmith work for the village, while another's chore might include working on the land. These occupations are passed from one generation to the other.

However, the custom of living together in one community is gradually fading. As the years pass, more Mennonites are buying their own farms, obtaining college degrees and generally moving away from the "one community" locations.

Because the Mennonites are a strict religious group, no one is baptized into the church until he or she is old enough to realize the importance of the step. The baptism service is usually held off until a person is between 14-18 years old.

Sexes Sit Apart in Church  
The men and women sit in different sections of the church and the ministers are chosen from the organization.

One Mennonite minister summed up by saying:  
"It is only a matter of time before there will be only a small, practically unnoticeable difference between the Mennonites and followers of other branches of the Protestant faith."
