British Problems Explained

Rev. Douglas Davis gave the members of The Stouffville Lions Club an interesting and instructive outline of conditions in England from a political angle, as he saw them, at a Lions meeting on Monday evening in the High School following the regular supper hour. The United Church pastor obtained a remarkable grasp of the tremendous situation facing the English people, which he presented in able form, while making some not too happy inferences to the attitude of many of Uncle Sam's newspapers whose readers and publishers had never been called on to suffer as the people on the tight little island had suffered through two wars in our time. Mr. Davis spent six weeks in England, and proved an observant student of conditions in his native country. He felt the labor government, perhaps, had overstepped the mark in attempting to carry out their many election promises when they found themselves in power. Nationalizing the coal mines was commended,

but the speaker thought the government might have rested there for a time, instead of rushing on and acquiring the railroads, and introducing state medicine too quickly in an effort to implement their election platform. With state medicine too many demand medical aid, and the physicians are fairly swamped with people suffering imaginary illnesses. Lion L. C. Murphy, this year's president, presided over the gathering which was better attended than any meeting this season.

Fire Threatened East End Grocery
Firemen did a smart job on Saturday evening when summoned to the premises of Alvin Klinck, east end grocer, where the roof of the living quarters attached to the grocery store was ablaze. Instead of fighting the fire by turning on the water from the roof, the men made their way up through a man-hole to the attic and attacked the flames from inside with better effect and less water damage to the house. In fact little or no water was allowed down into the rooms since the nozzle sent the water hurling from inside the roof outward. The fire was first noticed by Miss Edna Lintner as she was proceeding to the store a few minutes after seven o'clock. Edna said smoke was belching out through the shingles, and it was the opinion of Fire Chief Del. Jennings that the blaze was caused from sparks from a bonfire burning earlier in the afternoon. The chief said sparks apparently dropped on the roof covered with at least a couple of layers of old cedar shingles. These smoldered and burned through to the inside of the roof then sprang into flames. Property damaged will be confined mostly to roof repairs.
