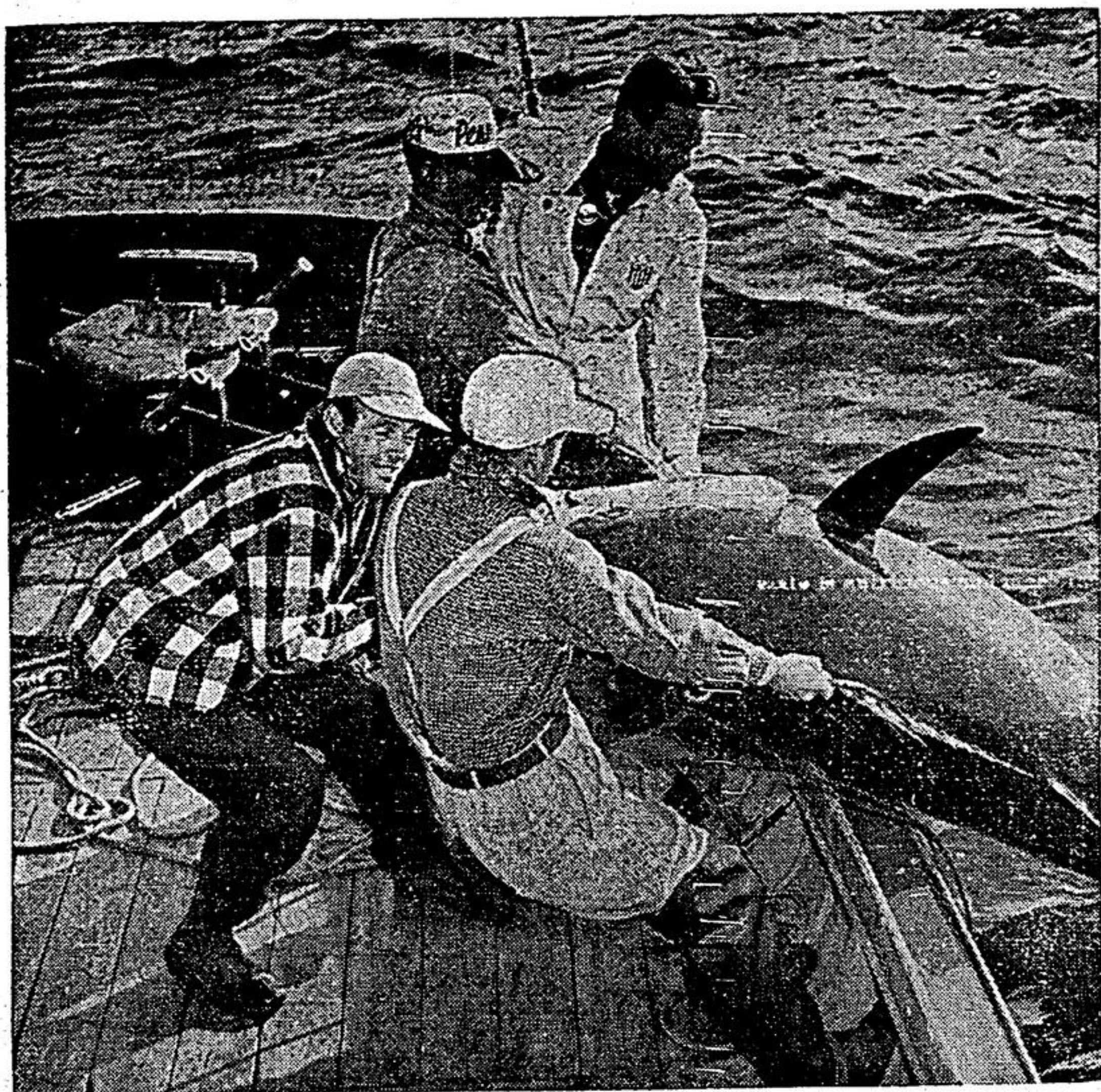


**Tony Had To Tussel For This Tuna!**

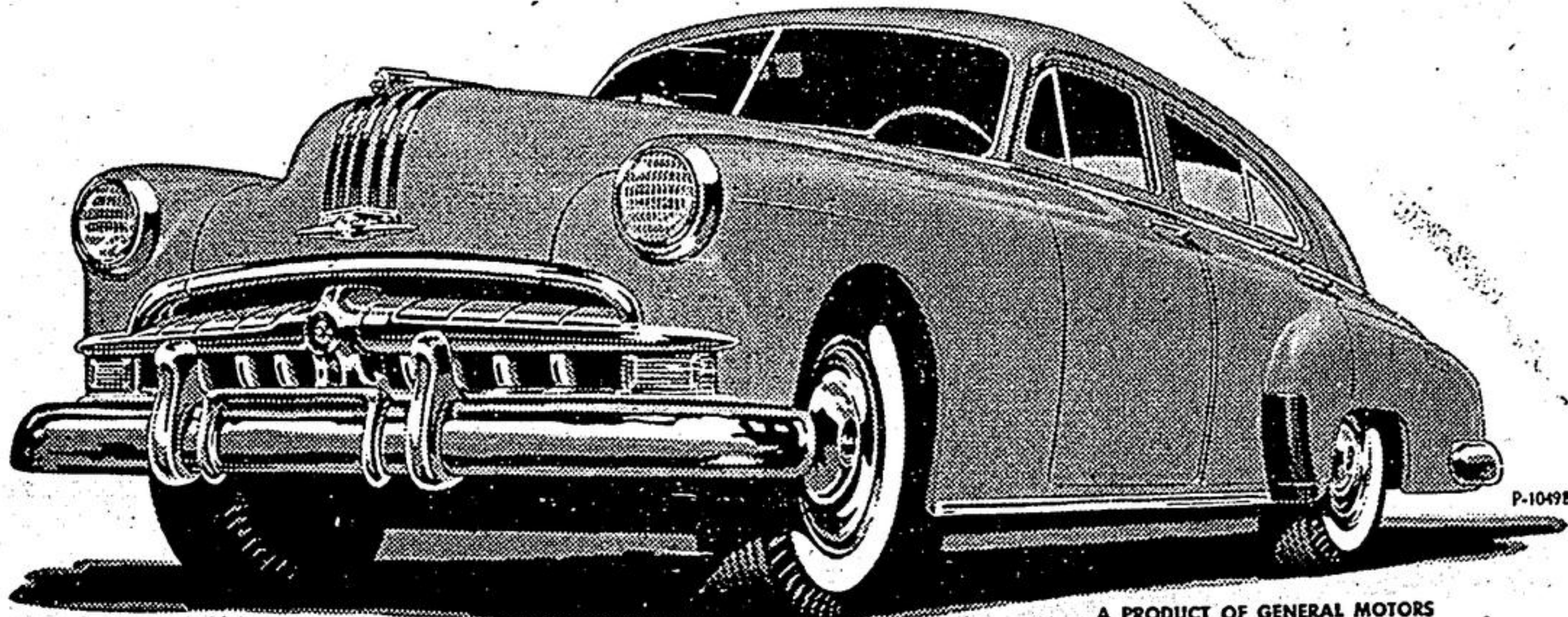

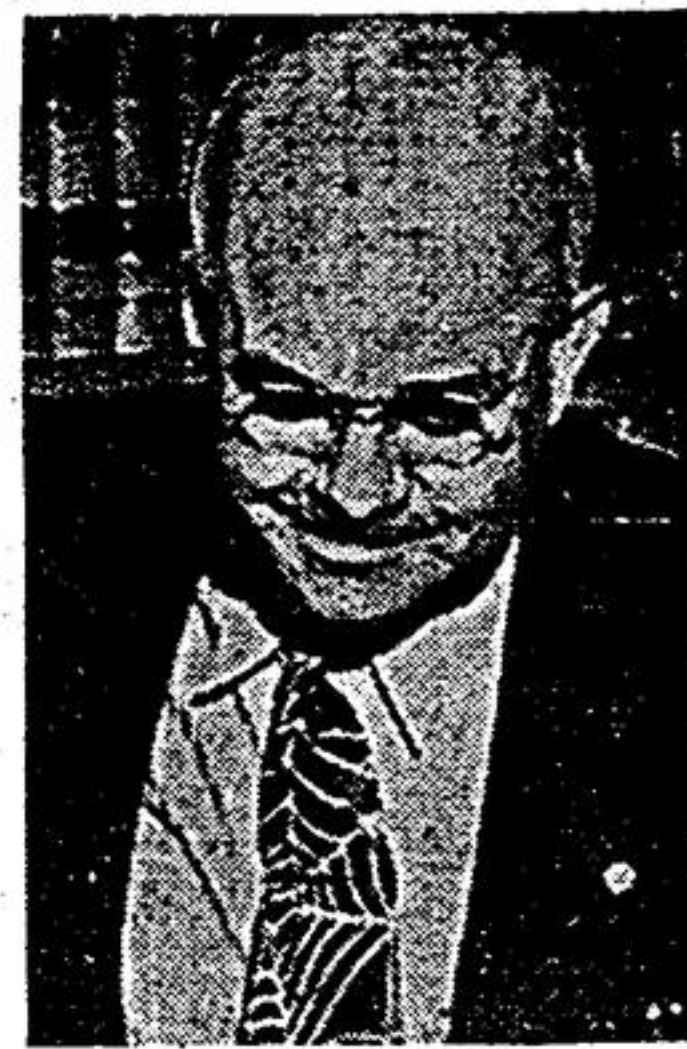

**Will Man Destroy Himself?**

 When Dr. Brock Chisholm is not debunking Santa Claus and denouncing fairy stories as pernicious literature for children, he is trying to make adults' flesh creep with the "fairy tales of science" and all the horrors yet to be. Not content with the terrors of atomic bomb and its power to destroy whole cities and their populations in an instant, the kindly doctor has gone further. He now informs us, according to a Reuter's report from Switzerland, that the atom bomb is obsolete as a war weapon, and he tells a harrowing tale of how the inhabitants of the entire world may be wiped out with seven ounces of a new biological product. If such fictitious stories as Jack the Giant Killer, the Forty Thieves and Blue Beard are bad for children's nerves, what of the effect of this latest scientific thriller upon the nerves of us older people? We were already jittery enough with the fear of being starved to death through the depletion of arable lands, to say nothing of being blown to bits by the atomic bomb. If Dr. Chisholm and his fellow prophets of doom continue to shock us in this way, the chances are that we will all become nervous wrecks or die of heart failure before the scientists can complete their demonstrations. "One war," says Dr. Chisholm, "may kill as many as 90 percent of the world's people." And all that with a few ounces of this terrible man-tox! It doesn't really matter whether it takes a few ounces or a few tons of the stuff to exterminate us, but the ounces make a better story, and Dr. Chisholm likes to show what clever fellows these scientists are. It never seems to occur to him that they are too devilishly clever, and he puts all the blame, prospectively, upon "Man" whom he likens to the dinosaurs, which he says became extinct "because they could no longer adapt themselves to the present." The dinosaurs, however, were not responsible for their own extinction. They were monstrous reptiles living in tropical swamps and were suddenly overwhelmed by the advent of the ice age. Being creatures of very low intelligence, they had no scientists amongst them and they had no warning or time to adapt themselves to arctic conditions. There is no comparison, therefore, between mankind and the dinosaurs. To predict or even suppose that Man would be so crazy as to compass his own universal destruction or that, as Dr. Chisholm suggests—"a few fanatical distributors could destroy mankind by biological warfare"—is fantastic. Even the most fanatical nations would hesitate to start a war with a biological weapon that would destroy themselves along with the rest of mankind. The only thing that kept Hitler from using poison gas and germs was the fear or retaliation in kind, for which the British had great stores of deadly fumes in readiness. The fact there is nothing original about this

latest scare story by Dr. Chisholm, except perhaps the small amount of seven ounces of something which he says could destroy the human race. If that did actually happen, it could be claimed that never were so many beings exterminated by so few ounces of a biological product. But there would be no biologists left to claim the credit.

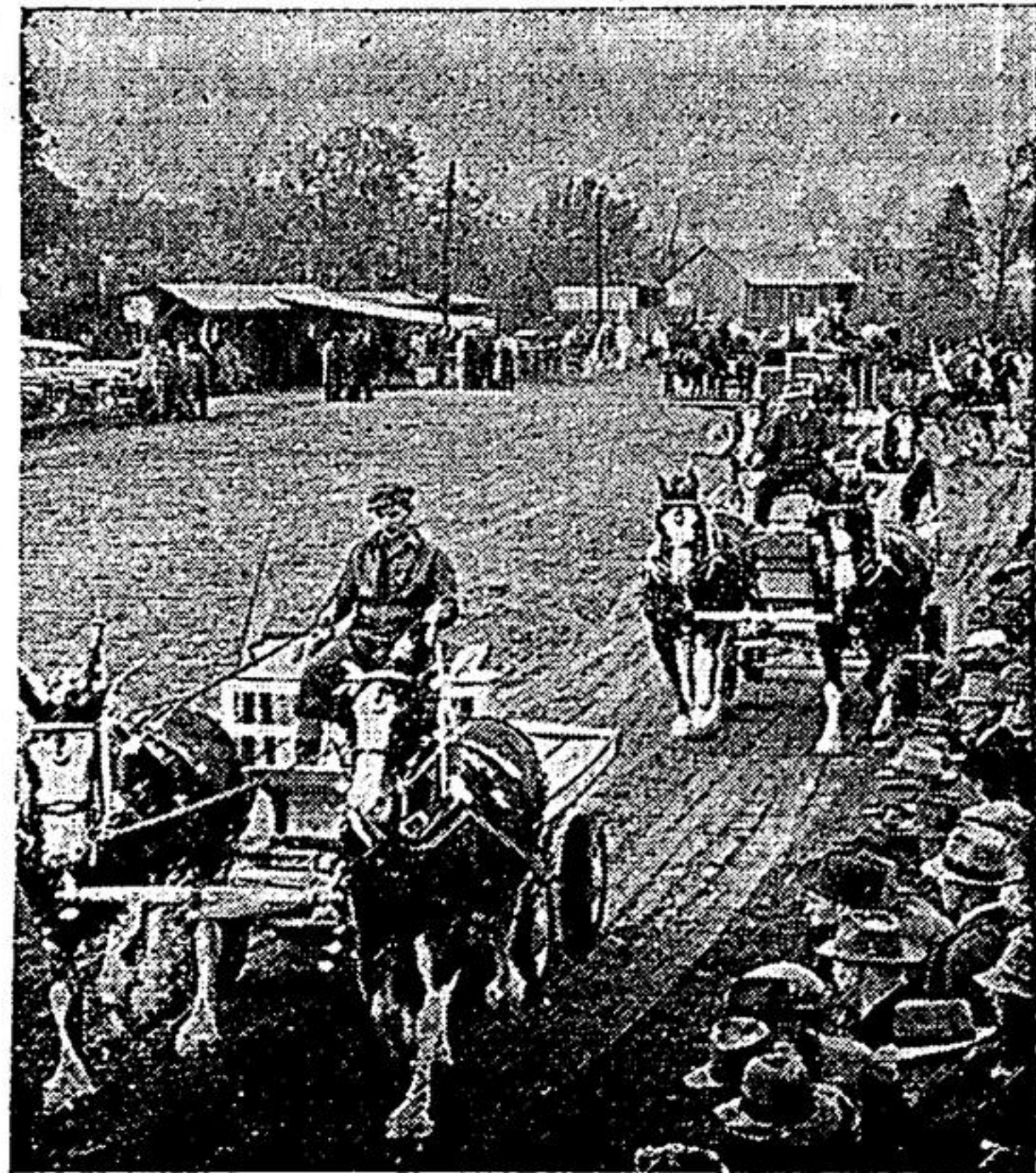
Before the second world war we were warned that if it happened it would "destroy civilization," and now, despite the fact that civilization has not been destroyed, Dr. Chisholm declares that "only a few more years of present behavior patterns will destroy the human race." He says there is only one problem in the competition for survival—the survival of man himself, and he adds: "It is of basic importance to the human race that the next generation should not be as our ancestors have been and that it does not have the same values. Otherwise it will behave in the same manner as we have and destroy the human race." That is surely a libel on our ancestors and on ourselves, for neither they nor we have entirely ignored human values and deliberately behaved in a manner to destroy the whole of mankind. If wars are more widely destructive, it is not due to our values or behavior, but to scientific inventions, which it is claimed are responsible for more deaths by accident in time of peace than in war.

In the past hundred years greater value has been set upon human life than ever before, so much so that the normal period of life has been extended, infant mortality has been vastly reduced, and the population of the world has been doubled. Not long ago Dr. Chisholm warned us that the world was getting overcrowded and that we would all starve to death if we didn't change our pattern of behavior in wasting the resources of the soil. He got that idea from several books, but it is an old scare story which originated over a hundred years ago with Malthus, who claimed that war, disease and poverty were necessary to keep the world from becoming overcrowded. So it would appear that, if anything, we have been behaving too well for our own survival.
