Cow Strays, Man Killed, 2 Cars, Truck Wrecked

One man was killed, three persons injured, two automobiles wrecked and a truck suffered damages in a series of accidents arising out of a stray cow being on the highway near Coldwater, about 3 miles west of Orillia.

Dead is Jack Fester, 36, of Toronto. Injured were Mrs. Fester, their son, Robert Wayne, 8, and the driver of the automobile, Marvin Woods, 39, of Midland.

The series of accidents started, police said, when an automobile driven by Otto Zinser of Orillia hit a cow which had strayed onto No. 12 highway. Zinser was not injured but the car was badly damaged.

The body of the cow was thrown into the path of an oncoming truck, driven by William Evans of Coldwater. He managed to stop in time.

crashed into the rear of the parked truck. The impact drove Woods' automobile under the truck platform.

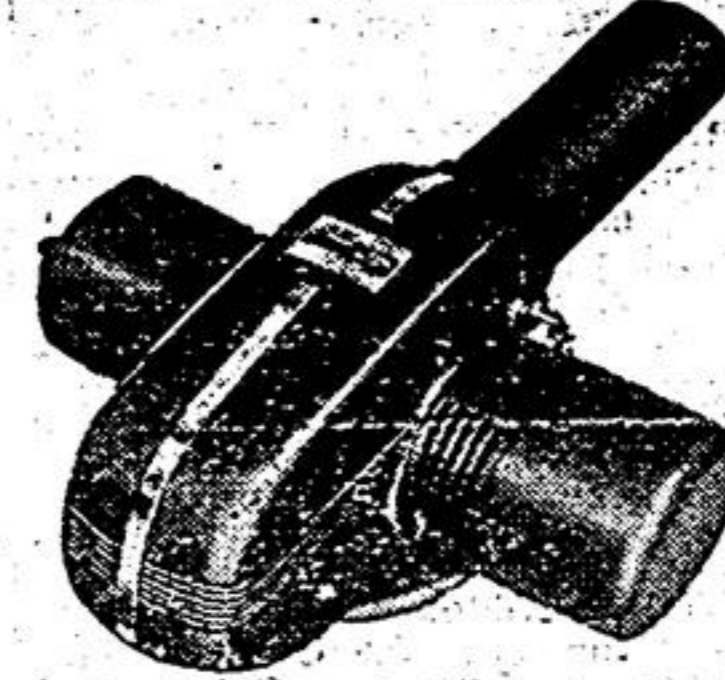
