OVER NORTH POLE

Vote 4 to 1 in Favor of Buses

Residents of North York, Richmond Hill, Vaughan and Markham Townships voted four to one for continuance of the present bus line on North Yonge St. Reeve P. H. Mitchell, North York, said only 10 per cent of those entitled to vote cast ballots. The result was: For, 1,202, against, 301.

In North York the vote was 690 for buses against 175 for return of the radial cars. In Vaughan it was 186 to 45; in Markham 153 to 39 and in Richmond Hill 173 to 42. Indication of the lack of interest was shown by the result at Elgin Mills, when only 18 persons out of an eligible 175 cast ballots. On the whole only 10% of the eligible voters cast their ballots.

Diesel buses have been serving the area from North Toronto to Richmond Hill for the past year, replacing radial cars. The buses are operated by the T.T.C. for the four municipalities. For the first

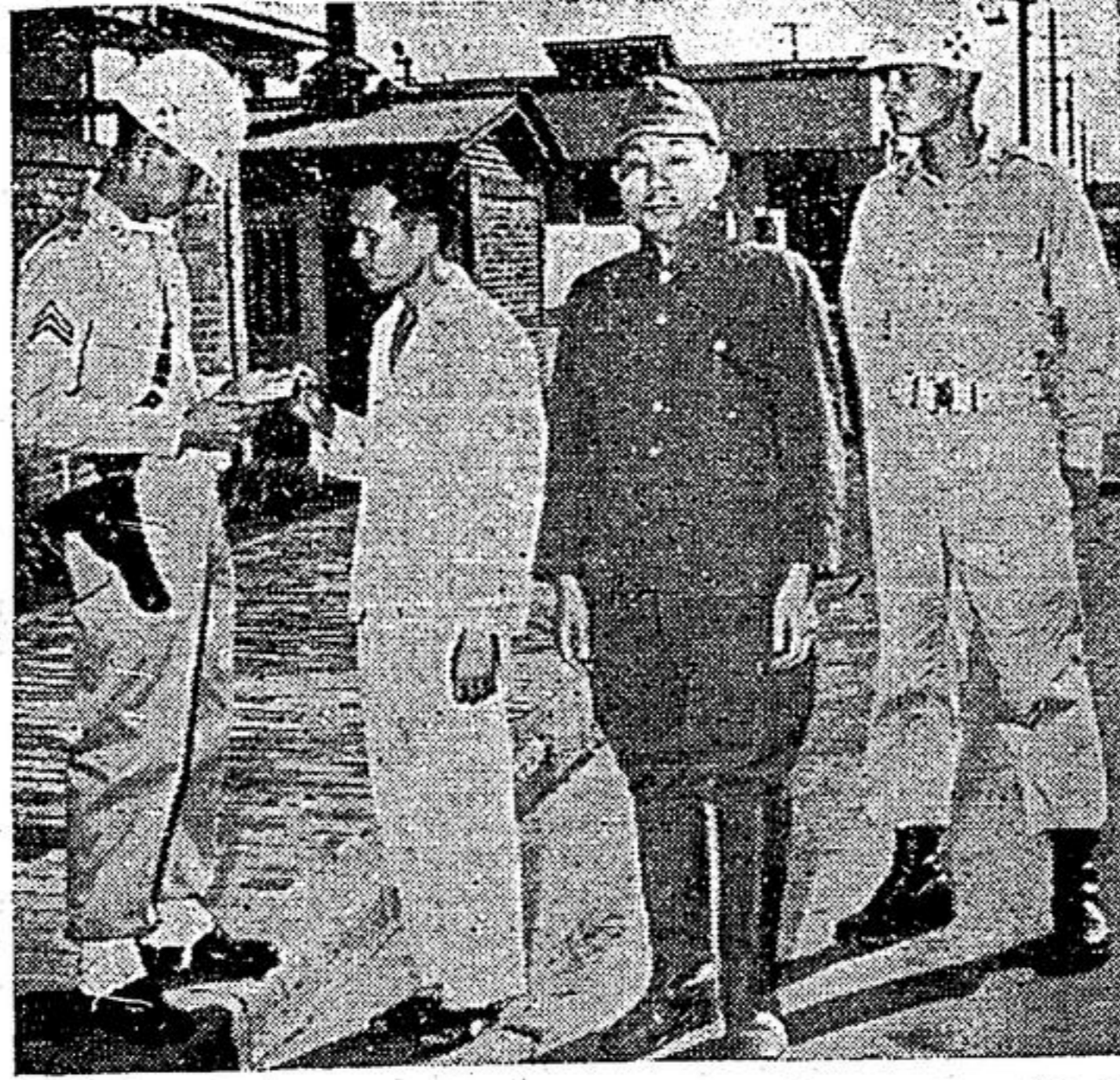
six months of 1949 the operating profit was double that of the corresponding period last year, when the street cars were in operation.

In Markham Township only the property owners and those with long-term leases are financially interested in that municipality who reside within a mile and a quarter of Yonge Street. If the railway fell into default it would be their concern and not any other portion of the municipality.

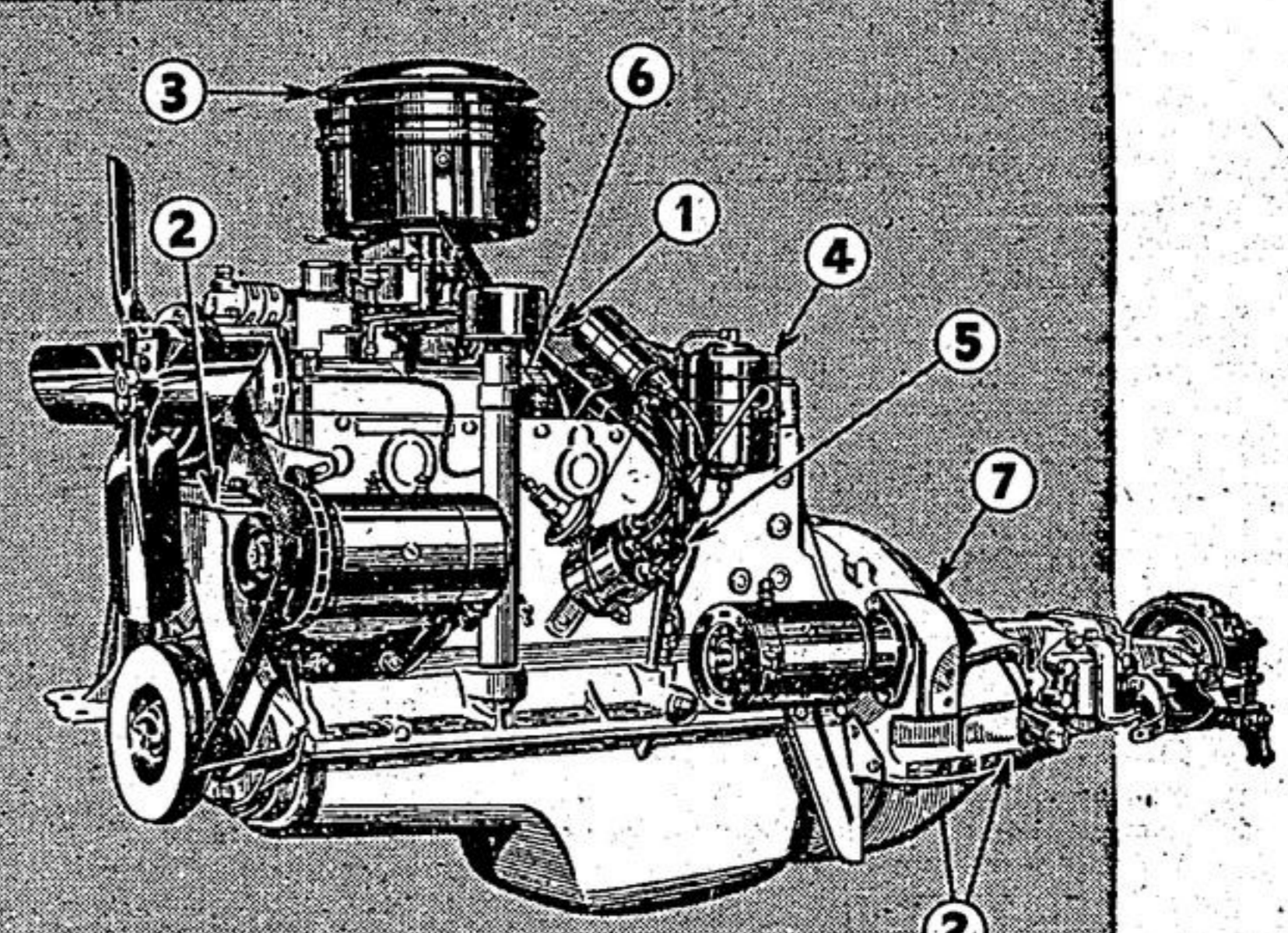

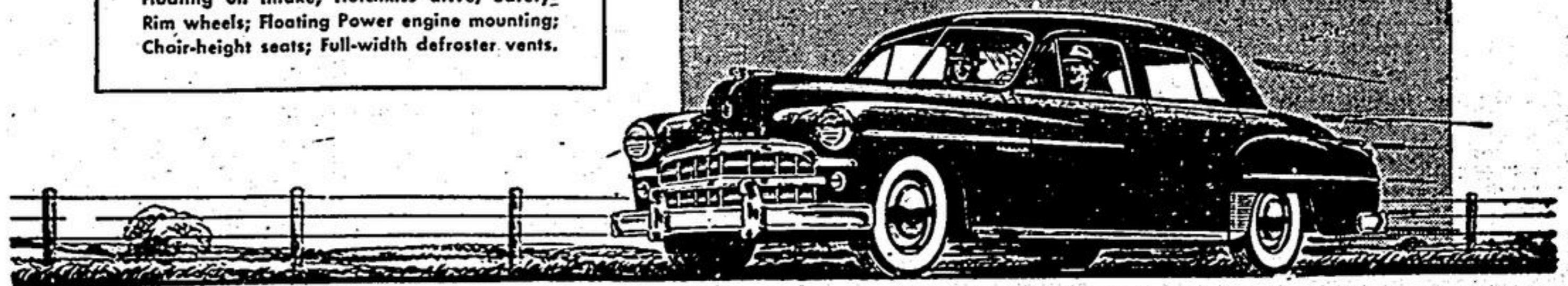
