### Highway Crash with Cow Ends in Large Award

Substantial settlement has been arranged in the action of Raitar Transport Ltd., Waterloo, vs. Weldon, London, Ont., broker, for damage to a Raitar truck and injuries to the driver, Sylvester Prenner, in an accident at Arva, Ont. The case was listed for hearing at the Supreme Court, Kitchener this week.

Statement of claim by the plaintiff company asked damages totalling \$6,161.64. The Workmen's Compensation Board put in a claim for \$9,000 for injuries suffered by the driver.

#### Truck Hit Cow

The crash occurred shortly after one a.m. July 15, 1947, when the truck hit an Aberdeen Angus cow which had strayed onto the road from a farm owned by Weldon.

The truck jack-knifed and ran into the abutment of the Medway Creek bridge. The car separated from the tractor and landed in the creek with the driver in it. The truck took fire and burned to a complete wreck.

The cow had knocked over a fence post in straying onto the road. The Raitar firm claimed negligence on the part of Weldon in not keeping his fence in efficient condition.

#### Counter-claim Withdrawn

Weldon in the settlement withdrew a counter-claim of \$1,600 for the cow.

The settlement includes substantial damages and costs which cannot be disclosed until the minutes of settlement are completed and endorsed at Osgoode Hall.

### Bold Attacker To Be Sentenced This Week

Charged with assault causing actual bodily harm, William Stunden, 32, of Oak Ridges, had a conviction registered against him in magistrate's court, Newmarket last week.

Complainant Fred Aldridge testified that Stunden was lying in wait for him when he arrived at the apartment he rented from Stunden around 2:30 a.m. September 27. He told the court that he went upstairs and charged that as he reached his door it was opened from within by Stunden who struck him.

William J. Aldridge, father of the complainant, testified that he was awakened around 3:30 a.m. that same night by a knock on his door. On opening the door his son tumbled in on the floor. "He looked as if he'd been in a threshing machine," said Mr. Aldridge. Mr. Aldridge, Sr., lives nearly six miles from Oak Ridges.

Testifying on his own behalf, Stunden claimed that Fred Aldridge was seven weeks' rent in arrears and that he thought he might leave that night. "I went up to his apartment and waited for him," said Stunden. "I stuck a knife in the door so I would hear him when he came home." Stunden claimed that Aldridge walked in and hit him in the stomach and that he chased him down the hall and "hit him a couple of times."

"I don't believe the accused, nor that there was any self-defence," said Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake in registering a conviction against Stunden. "It's absurd that the complainant, a frail little man, struck Stunden first."

On the request of Crown Attorney Arleigh Armstrong, Stunden was remanded one week for sentence. Stunden, who asked for time to straighten out his business affairs, was allowed bail which was set at \$5,000 cash or \$10,000 property.

### Husband and Wife Build Their Own Home Without Aid of Carpenters

Stories of enterprising couples who have built their own home are perhaps few, yet not unheard of. Stouffville has one of these couples in Mr. and Mrs. William Miller who took over the Dickson farm on Main street east. Their attractive cottage bungalow stands today completed outside, and sufficiently finished inside as to be an accommodating home for the Millers and their children. The intriguing thing about the whole enterprise is that Mr. and Mrs. Miller did every bit of carpentering work, and drove every nail that went into the construction from cellar to tip of the roof. ### REMINDS FARMERS OF APPEAL RIGHTS

"Farmers should not be frightened into accepting unreasonable assessments for income tax purposes," R. A. Stewart, Almonte, chairman of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture income tax committee, said in Toronto recently.

Mr. Stewart said that income tax officials are at present active in parts of Ontario. He said that "any farmer who feels that he is being unreasonably treated, considering the circumstances, has the right to appeal his case."

"The income tax committee of the Federation would like to learn of any cases of dissatisfaction," Mr. Stewart said.

### GARDEN CLUB HEARS MARKHAM GROWER

British Columbia bulb growers are finding it difficult to compete with Holland production, Nick Shutkin of Markham Florists told Whitley Garden Club at a meeting in that town. Reasons cited are that the Dutch growers employ very advanced methods of production and that the B.C. florists lack certain facilities.

Filled with the lore and knowledge of growing which has been handed down to him from three generations of Dutch growers, Mr. Shutkin gave an intensely interesting address. Many points were of practical interest to the large audience which attended.

He showed large tulip bulbs from Holland, which are now produced in two years but formerly took eight years to attain the same size. The audience was interested when Mr. Shutkin cut bulbs apart to plainly show how the whole future plant, stem, leaves, petals and the bloom, could be seen in embryo and how the bulbs' degree

Combine milk with remaining 1/2 cup molasses; alternately add with remaining dry ingredients. Beat for half a minute. Bake for 45 minutes in a 9 inch square pan in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.). While hot, cut in squares and top with sliced ripe bananas and whipped cream or custard sauce.

of progress could be ascertained in this way.

As an expert on iris, he gave some tips to the audience. 60,000 of his bloom produced yearly are shipped to all parts of the country. Mr. Shutkin stressed the need for foresight on the part of commercial producers.

Speaking on chrysanthemums, he showed magnificent stems as samples. Great care is required in preparing the soil and sterilizing it for the cuttings. When planted, first a heavy watering is given, then very little water, the plants

are on their own. Mr. Shutkin showed how to trim the plant and the blooms. He said that "mums do best in a lean soil and require very little fertilizer."

Turning to the subject of tulips, Mr. Shutkin detailed how to handle them at this time of year. Constant temperatures should be maintained and ventilation provided no matter what the outside temperature. There is no need to plant them deep, but lots of drainage under the bulbs is needed.
