Thieves made an unsuccessful attempt to break into the C.N.R. station at Uxbridge one night last week. They were scared off by police.

Shortly before midnight, Bruce Blakey, no fixed abode, was arrested on a vagrancy charge. He pleaded guilty to the charge in Magistrate's Court in Whitby within 48 hours of committing the offence and was remanded in custody one week for sentence. Blakey had a pair of pliers and snips in his possession when arrested.

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## Adjourn Hearing On Ajax Setup

Fourth hearing before the Ontario Municipal Board to have Ajax incorporated into a town was held Monday at Brougham. The hearing was adjourned until Nov. 8 to present further information to the board. Meanwhile the Central Mortgage and Housing Corp. will negotiate with Pickering Township to have the 3,000-acre government-owned Ajax lands transferred to the township. A request by CMHC to have the boundaries of Ajax extended to include 800 acres for an improvement area was made.

E. F. Bastedo, representing 25 farmers in the area, said the extension of the limits of Ajax was protested 100 per cent.

George Findley and Angus McClesky, appearing for CMHC said no farm would be included in the 800-acre improvement area. They said it would be a green belt established to control the industrial growth of the community.
