During her active life here Mrs. Morris was an untiring worker in the Bloomington Christian Church, being a valued member of the choir where she displayed considerable ability. She had been living in Ottawa with a nephew, Mr. H. Swales.

The funeral service from O'Neill's Chapel in Stouffville on Monday was conducted by Rev. E. Morton, and interment was made in Stouffville cemetery.

Mr. Albert Hoover enjoyed the rare later October treat last Sunday of a dish of raspberries from his garden.

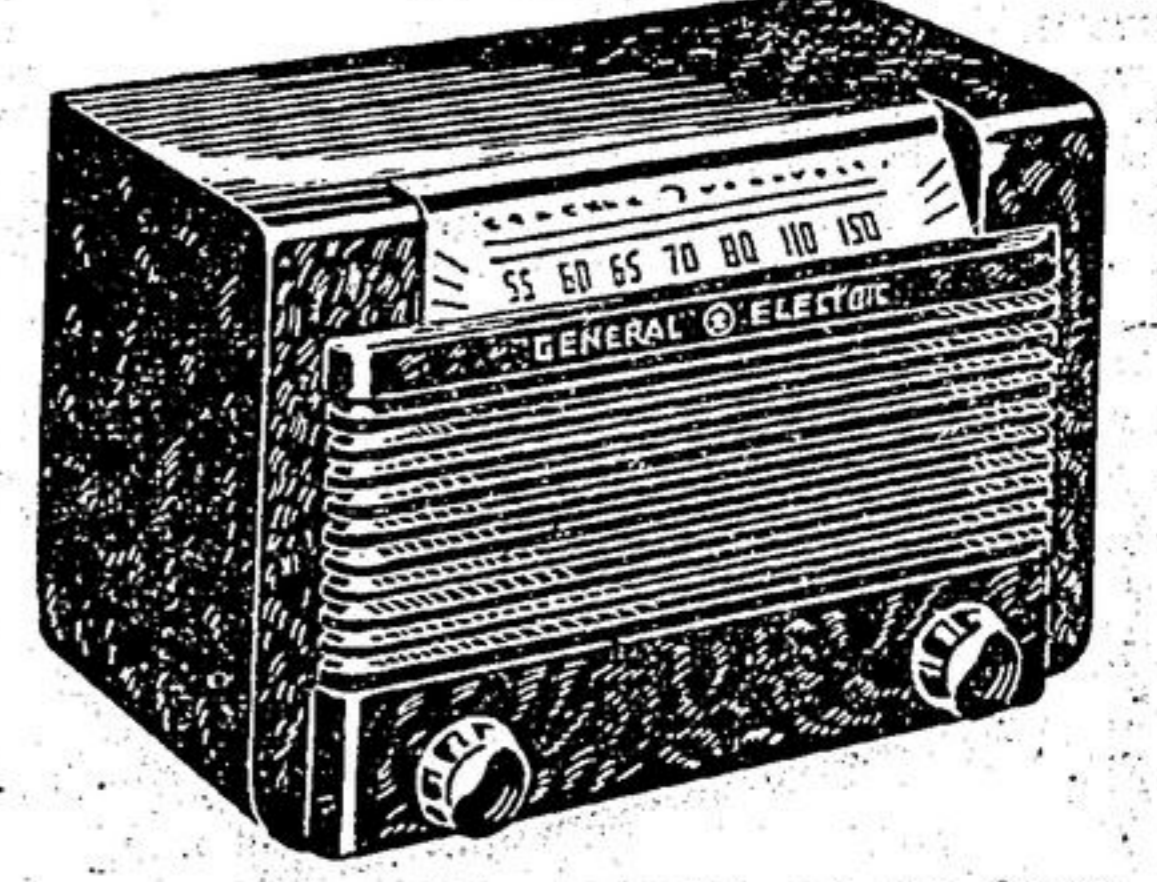
