Eddie Crouch, son of Ed. Crouch, former Stouffville Junior hockey coach some seasons back, has had a fine showing in his try with Guelph Biltmores this season. Crouch was a standout last year with North Toronto Lions, a junior 'B' team likely to see action in the Stouffville group.

There'll be a Junior 'B' hockey team operating at Agincourt this winter, coached by Jerry Junkin. Junkin has been prominent as a senior mercantile player in Toronto, and was frequently seen refereeing exhibition games at Markham.

New ventilators have been added to the Markham arena and may aid in keeping the ice in better shape than last year. Since there was no escape for the warm air, naturally the ice had to absorb the heat.

Stouffville Clippers will play in Peterborough next Friday night, November 4th. Peterborough returning here the following week, date to be announced. Peterborough Legion, it will be recalled, won the Senior 'B' championship last winter.

Doug Campbell has been elected president of the Newmarket O.H.A. intermediate hockey club. Delbert Cooper handles the books, and the team manager is Stan Smith. The team is sponsored by the Hoffman Machinery Co., and expects to play intermediate 'A' hockey and be grouped with three intermediate 'B' clubs from Bradford, Aurora and Sutton. The O.H.A. is expected to place Stouffville with this quartette.

At time of writing it looked as if there would be hockey a-plenty around here by next week. Providing the new arena opens with public skating this Saturday night as expected, Stouffville's Intermediate and Junior 'B' hockey clubs will come together in an exhibition game on Monday night, while on Friday night Markham meet Peoples' of Toronto in an exhibition go.

Bookings are becoming tighter and tighter at the new arena, but everything is being done to preserve all the time necessary for local events and organizations. While a decision has not been given out for the press, it may be that the arena directors will offer two afternoons per week to the curling fraternity for their use. Should a curling club be organized and desire to hold a special event such as an all day bonspiel, arrangements to take over an evening could be made at that time. Oshawa Skating Club has also made contact with the management regarding the use of some daytime hours during the winter.

At a meeting of the Stouffville Intermediate and Unionville hockey executives last weekend, Unionville was given an invitation by Stouffville to throw in their lot with the local aggregation. What players are available at Unionville would try for the Stouffville team, and several Unionville executive members would be added to the local executive if they so desired. A tentative agreement was reached on this point, with Unionville represented by Messrs. Bill Hood, Stan Stiver and Vern Griffin. The Stouffville Intermediate entry expects to be grouped with such places as Sutton, Newmarket, Bradford, Aurora, with some possibility of Whitby squeezing into Intermediate 'B'. Population rules which bar towns of over 4,000 from 'B' rating may be bypassed in some cases this season.

Markham Millionaires have definitely decided on an Intermediate 'A' team this season. Since no import players are being drawn from Toronto proper the O.H.A. has given them permission to remain in the same class as last year. Markham's players from Toronto's suburbs are permissible.

John Wegg reports that all their regular players turned out to practise on Sunday. Harry Milroy, the old hockey "war horse", was on hand again this year and will probably make the team once more. One advantage of Intermediate 'A' competition is the chance to enter into the Northern Ontario and Quebec series if and when the team is successful in its own grouping. No definite teams have been lined up for opposition as yet but the management is working on this at present.

Tentative date of the official grand opening of the arena is the week of Nov. 21st. Sport and government bigwigs will officiate, and it is expected that Oshawa Skating Club will put on a fancy ice show. Watch for the date, and get your tickets early at the box office. Over a thousand seats reserved.

A popular player in Stouffville Junior hockey and also in baseball for some years, Polly Minton put his name to a Stouffville Intermediate certificate last week. Minton is at present centering a fast-stepping line with Kelly and Clarke on the wings. Bill Bradbury, member of last year's club is getting back into form, and was flying in last week's practice. Swiftly Todd of Goodwood who has been working out with Stouffville, was not out last week, and rumour has it here that he will return to the Newmarket fold this season. Wright, Marlboro Junior, who has impressed Coach Fife, has been signed, and permission to use one of New York Rangers' chattels, has been received from Frank Boucher, Ranger boss. Jack Drummond, ex-Oshawa player is also ready for signing. Allen Boadway, Stouffville's relief goalie, will see some action quite shortly in exhibition games here. Stouffville management is picking players slowly, and not quite three-quarters of the squad has been signed so far.

Change Advocated In Hockey Scoring

Should a hockey player receive the high scoring award at the end of a season just because he officially scored more goals and assists?
Or should he be credited on a point system, whereby more points are given for effort?
The question was brought up by Ivan Miller (Hamilton Spectator) in a recent column.
"If a player figures in a direct scoring play, he's entitled to an assist," writes Miller, "but we cannot see where's he's entitled to credit on a scoring effort when a goal is set up almost entirely through the efforts of someone else."
In a fast-moving game like hockey, it is not always the referee's fault if he fails to see which player scored or assisted. Miller writes that he has seen referees inquire of a team, and have not only the scorer, but those assisting, pointed out to him."
The Hamilton scribe is of the opinion that assists are too cheaply earned and suggests that by putting a heavier premium on them they could be made to stand for a true indication of a player's worth.

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POWER REGULATIONS MUST BE ENFORCED

A reduction in power deliveries from one of the Commission's suppliers makes it necessary for all consumers to avoid wasting electricity. The Commission has advised the municipal systems that strict compliance with regulations respecting the use of electricity is essential.

Voluntary conservation is also needed. Homes, industries and farms can play their full part by reducing the use of electricity at all times, particularly during the hours of maximum use, from 10 to 12 in the morning and 4 to 6 in the afternoon.

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
