It took Auctioneer William Maw from 12.30 to 5.30 to dispose of the many articles, some of them of great value, and buyers came from far and near to bid on them. The crowd was estimated at over 800 people, and the sum of \$2,500 poured into the cash register.

Pickering Cow Has Fine Record

There has recently been an upswing in the number of Jersey cows qualifying in Ontario County and during the last week reports that have come in show that the herd of George T. Todd, Pickering, has the high cow. Toddview Royal Lady, No. 160045, as a senior four-year-old in 365 days produced 8,756 lbs. of milk, 532 lbs. of fat with a test of 6.08%.

Second high cow, Basil's Calais, No. 16129, in the herd of Stonehaven Farm, Whitby, Ontario, produced, as a junior four-year-old in 364 days, 9,260 lbs. of milk, 529 lbs. of fat with a test of 5.71%. Calais is a daughter of the silver medal bull Brampton Basil Son, No. 102180.

The herd of Frank M. Chapman, Pickering also reports a good record made by Pickering Noble Sadie, No. 166006. Sadie went on test as a senior three-year-old and in 365 days produced 9,195 lbs. of milk, 455 lbs. of fat.

Most cows qualifying come from the herd of Bokar Farm at Whitby with the six cows qualifying all in the two-year-old division.
