Firemen said Mrs. Case, 52, woke at 5 a.m. when she smelled smoke. She rushed down the hall to the sleeping children's room and saw flames shooting from a closet on one side of the room.

Seizing two basins, Mrs. Case filled them in the bathroom, threw them against the door of the closet and slammed it shut.

She then snatched the two children from their beds and fled down the stairs.

By this time two of her sons, who live in the farm home with

her, had awakened and while one called the Aurora fire brigade, the other and Mrs. Case returned to the blazing room where they held the fire in check until firemen arrived.

The two children, Linda, five, and Lorne, two, were taken to the apartment of Mrs. Steve Case who lives with her mother-in-law.

Anglican Rector Here 40 Years Ago

Former Anglican rector at Stouffville Rev. H. W. Dennis Cooper died in Rochester, N.Y., on Sunday, in his 76th year. As a young man he ministered in the parish at Stouffville and resided in the house on Main Street right in the business area where now lives Mrs. Irwin Gray. This was known as the parish house 40 years ago when Mr. Cooper was located here. He left Stouffville to serve on other parishes in Canada and finally in New York. He was born on the Isle of Wight, England.

"I recall Mr. Cooper as rector here, and remember that he was very active and likeable citizen," said Mr. Frank Rae to The Tribune this Wednesday morning.

Former Magistrate William Keith Died in 80th Year

Former MPP for North York, warden of York County and a county magistrate until he retired in 1944, William Keith, 80, a farm boy who rose to the highest offices in the county without the advantages of higher education was buried at Newmarket on Saturday. He died at his home near Newmarket on Thursday.

One of the most popular magistrates ever to sit on a Toronto bench, Mr. Keith won the respect and admiration of both those upon whom he passed judgment and counsels who, unlike himself, had years of legal education. Common sense influenced his judgment more often than did his law books.

Born at Sharon, Mr. Keith was educated at Sharon public school. He was elected to Newmarket Council at the age of 26 in 1906 and later served the town as mayor for 21 years. He was a Conservative member of the Ontario legislature from 1923 to 1926 and was appointed a York County magistrate in 1929. He was superannuated after 15 years at County Court, Adelaide St., Toronto.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at St. Paul's Anglican Church and interment was in Newmarket Cemetery. York County police officers were pallbearers.

Surviving are his wife, the former Mary F. Caroline Simpson and one son, W. Hargreave Keith, of Guelph.

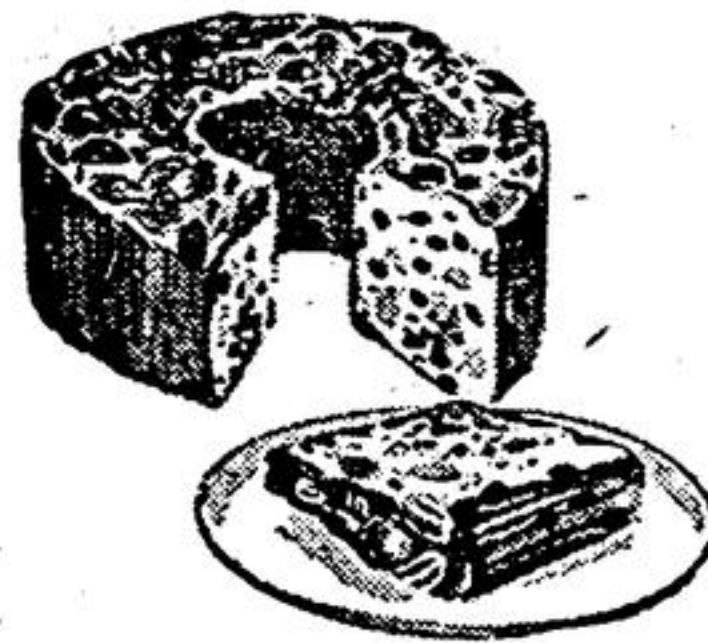

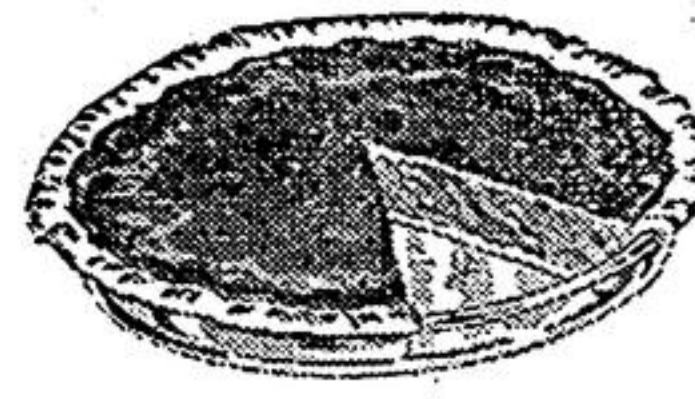

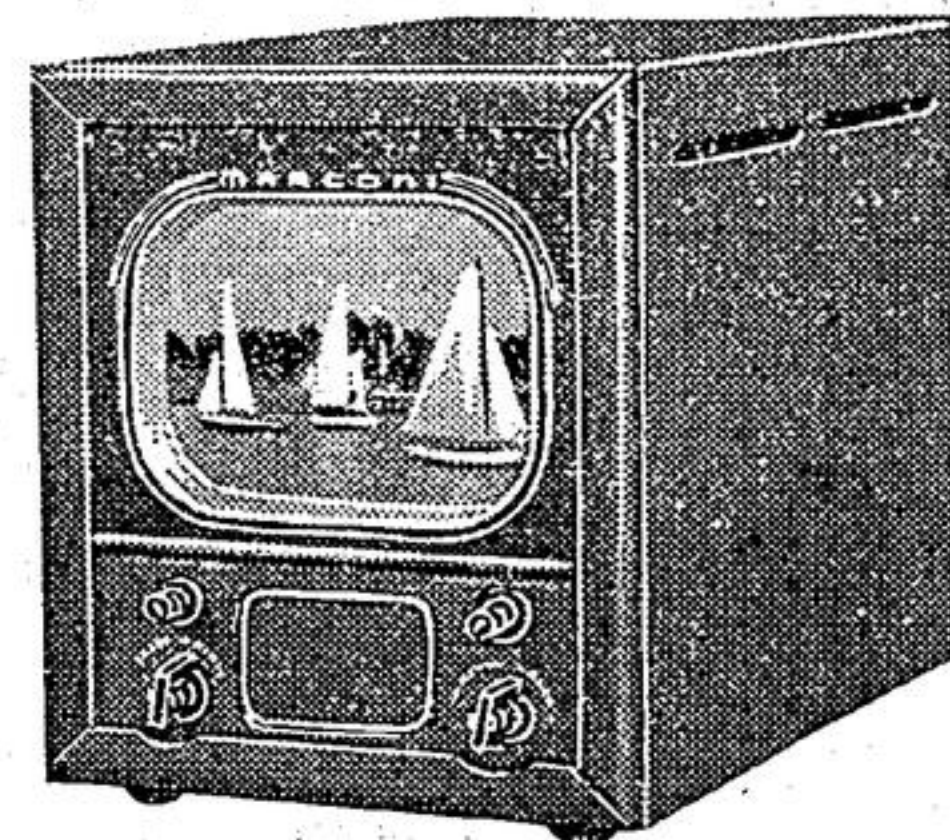
