UNAWARE HIS SHOP AFIRE, LED TO SAFETY

Unaware that his premises were on fire, the proprietor of the Douglas Drug Store at Bobcaygeon was led safely from his store about six o'clock one evening last week when a passerby saw smoke issuing from the rear of the building. Mr. Douglas was unaware of the fire until then. A Bobcaygeon informant says it is not yet understood how the fire started. An oil heater, in operation at the time of the outbreak, was found to be still burning and in good order when the fire was extinguished, and one version has it that the blaze originated in some of the stock stored at the back of the shop. Damage is understood to be extensive, although mostly confined to the rear of the building. It is believed that insurance to the value of about \$4,000 was carried on the stock in the store.
