THE MIXING BOWL

Hello Homemakers! Keep supplies on hand for an impromptu after-the-game supper. Serve a hot and hearty meal in one dish such as cheese spaghetti, creamed eggs on biscuits, baked beans in casserole, waffles and maple syrup, curried rice with bacon, or salmon burgers. Many foods are now available in prepared mixes at a reasonable price..... the spaghetti is packaged with grated cheese; the dried eggs in tins; biscuit mix in boxes; and then there is waffle mix, bottled syrup, instant rice, canned sausages, aerd roll mix, instant coffee, and canned cream or evaporated milk.

Some of these foods require baking, but even this does not prevent having an amount already cooked for a crowd if you have freezing space in the refrigerator for keeping. However, if you have working space in the kitchen, it is good thing to encourage the 'teen-agers' to concoct their own refreshments. Sometimes the young folk will make very weak coffee and enjoy it which is something for which you would be chastized. The most appreciated act is the offer of assistance by two or three people in clearing and washing dishes.

Nimble Doughnuts

1½ cups sifted flour
2 tsp. baking powder
¼ tsp. salt
1 tbsps. melted shortening
½ cup sugar
2 egg yolks
½ tsp. vanilla
1 tbsps. orange rind
¾ cup milk
lard for deep fat frying

Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Beat together thoroughly lard, shortening, sugar, egg yolks, vanilla and orange rind. Add milk. Stir in the dry ingredients until thoroughly mixed. Drop batter by small spoonfuls into deep hot fat at 360 degrees. Fry until brown on one side, then the other. Makes about 18 doughnuts.

Mrs. T. R. requests recipe for:

Fudge Frosting

2 cups sugar
½ cup milk
1½ tbsps. butter
2 squares chocolate
1 tbsps. corn syrup
1 tsp. vanilla
6 marshmallows

Put first five ingredients into a saucepan and boil to the softball stage (234 degrees). Remove from the electric element and stir in the marshmallows until they dissolve. Cool and add vanilla, then beat to the desired consistency.

Dog Gone 28 Days Found in Clothes Closet

It shouldn't happen to a dog, but it did.

Punch, a 2-year-old black Cocker Spaniel owned by Miss Sybil Burton disappeared Oct. 17.

Miss Burton who lives in Zanesville down in Ohio State but summers at Musselman's Lake, advertised in the newspaper and telephoned friends.

But Punch couldn't be found and the owner gave up the dog for lost.

On Nov. 14, Mrs. Burton Dodd, sister of Punch's mistress, went to the third floor of the 20-room Burton mansion in search for her over shoes. She opened a clothes closet and there lay Punch. After 28 days without food or water, he had lost 12 pounds and was pretty weak but he was alive.

A veterinarian fed him sparingly. Punch rallied. Two days later he developed pneumonia. But he recovered, and is returning to normal.

Miss Burton speculated that the dog became locked in the closet when she was showing friends through the house Oct. 17. The veterinarian said Punch came through the ordeal alive probably because he had been well fed previously.

'Bootleggers Wide Open' in Beaverton, Ask Liquor Store Vote

The village of Beaverton is dividing into two camps in preparation for a vote to be taken there under the Liquor Licence Act of Ontario. It will be held on Monday, December 12, in conjunction with the municipal elections. Only one question will be asked: "Are you in favor of the establishment of government liquor stores....."

"The bootleggers are running wide open here," one Beaverton businessman told newsmen. It is a well known fact that illegal sale of liquor has reached alarming proportions. I don't drink myself but I do feel that a government liquor store would be a deterrent to the bootlegging that is being carried on."

Nearest liquor stores are at Sutton and Lindsay, 20 and 30 miles away. Beer is sold at a Brechin hotel seven miles away and is also obtainable at Jackson's Point and Lindsay.

This town of 1,000 population is

policed by the Ontario Provincial Police. In summer it becomes the shopping centre for 6,000 or more due to its importance as a Lake Simcoe summer resort. Then, the illegal sale of liquor reaches a peak, residents say.

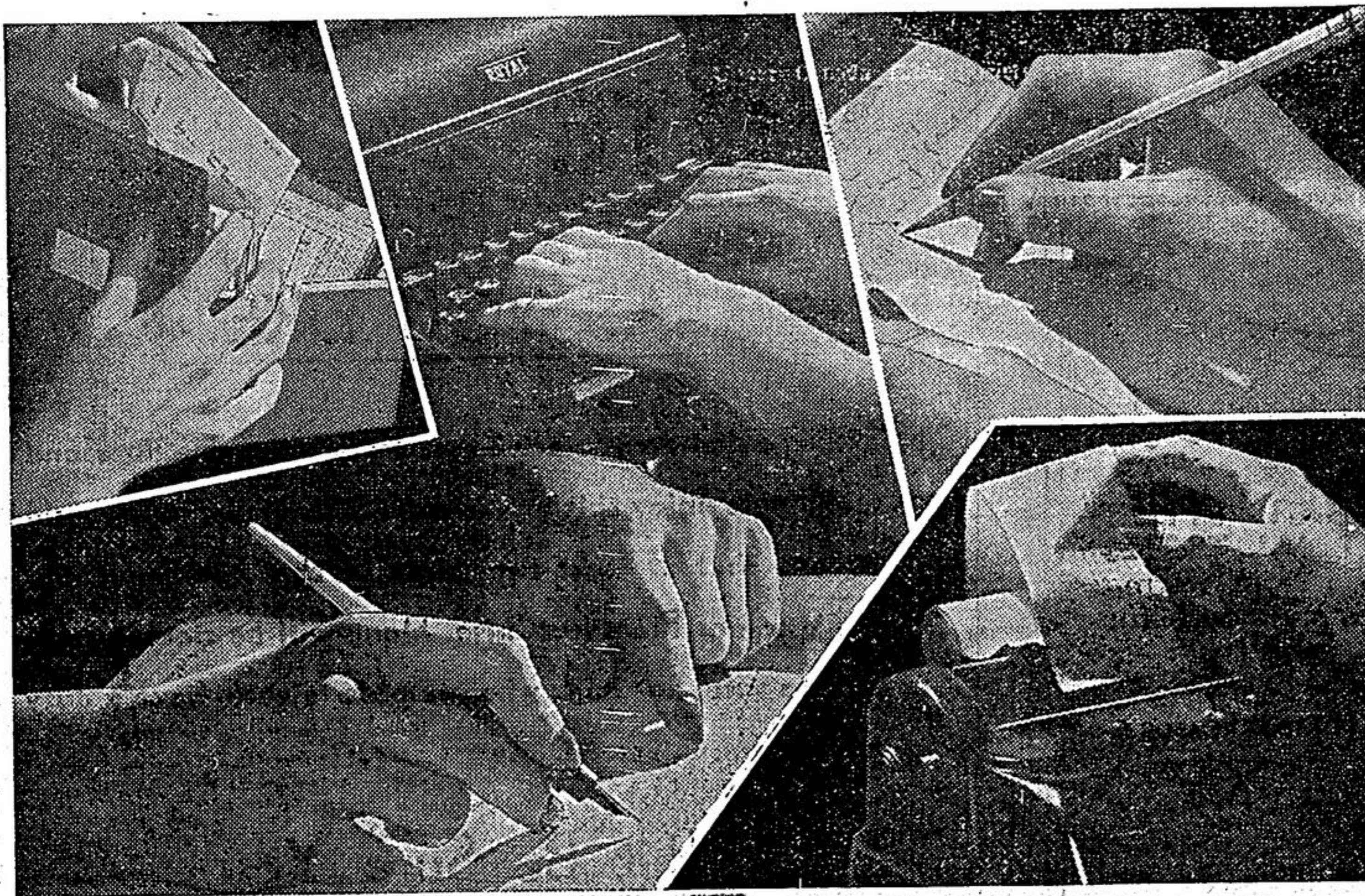
