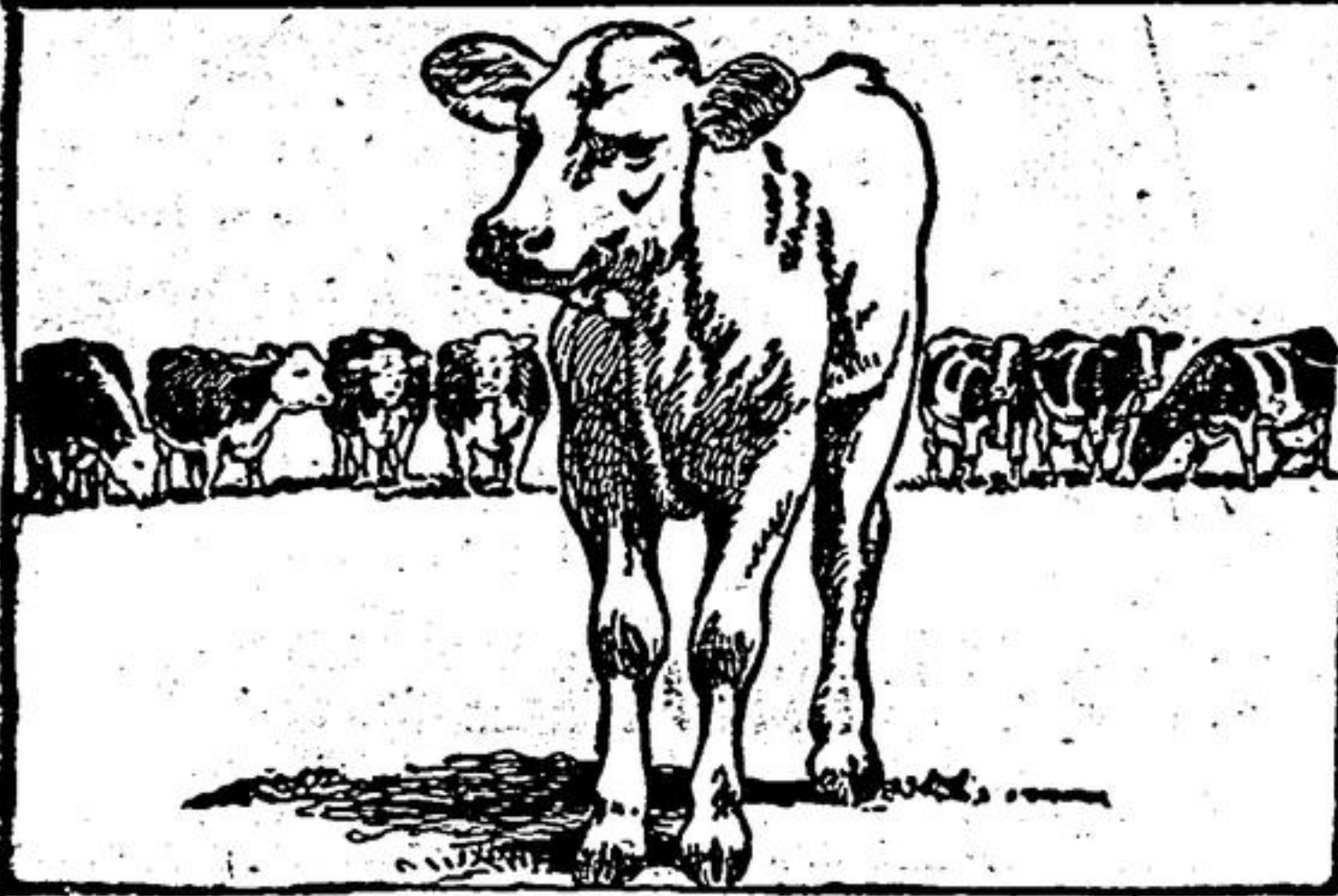

Cigarettes Up—

The 35c package of cigarettes so common in Ontario is to be raised to 36c. It is almost today, or is it? The federal government collects a huge tax from cigarette smokers, \$170,000,000 a year. On every package sold the government taxes 21.58 cents or better than a cent for every cigarette sold. It's a tax that deserves to be paid, and non-smokers can take their only comfort from a second-hand smoke, by remembering that one hundred and seventy millions annually rolls into Ottawa from this cloud of smoke. Still it doesn't make second-hand smoke any more pleasant when blown at you across a restaurant table.

To Install Officers

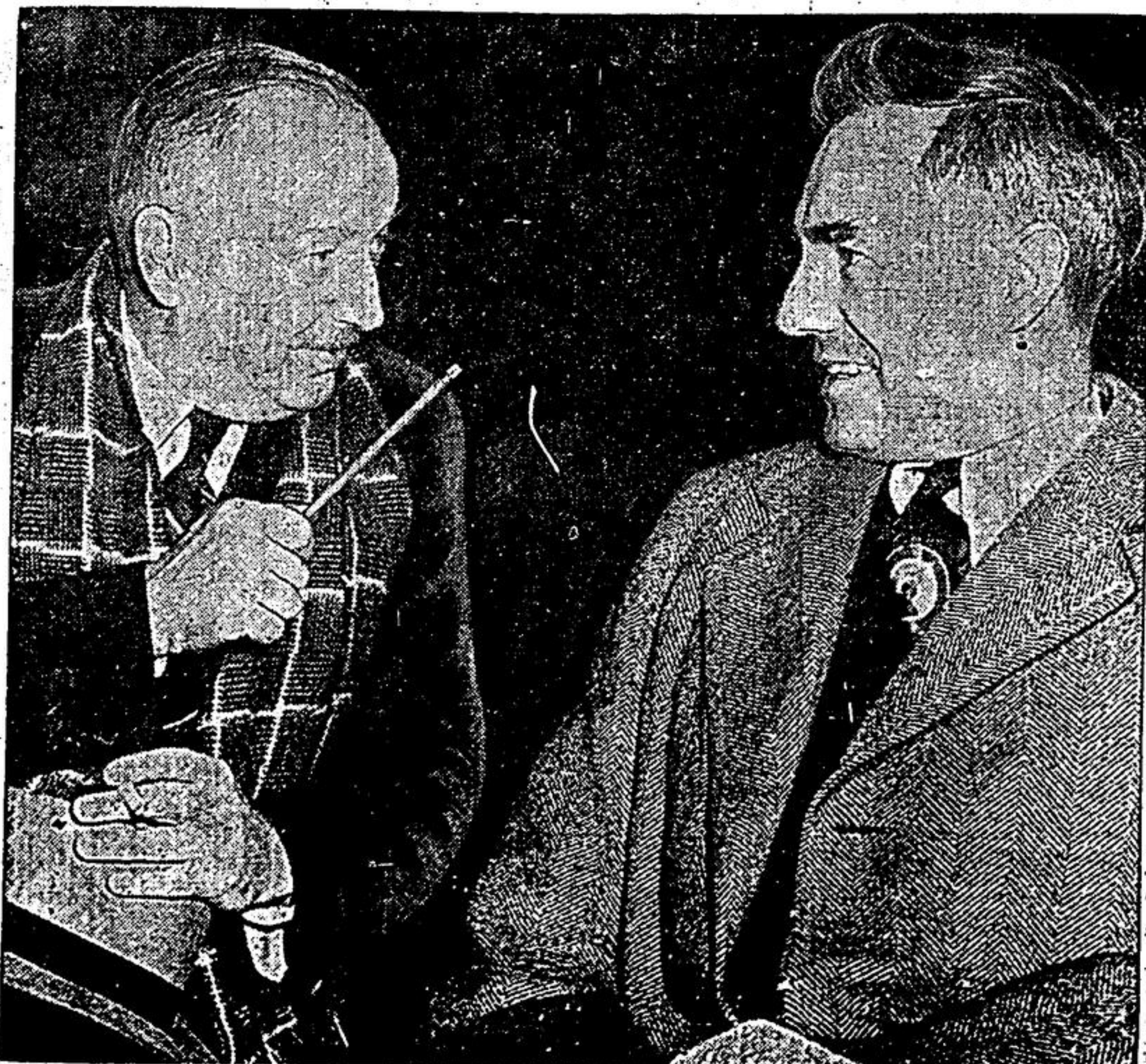
