School reopened on Wednesday last with Mrs. Pratt in charge and Mrs. Eastwood teaching the music. A large attendance of pupils for the winter is expected.

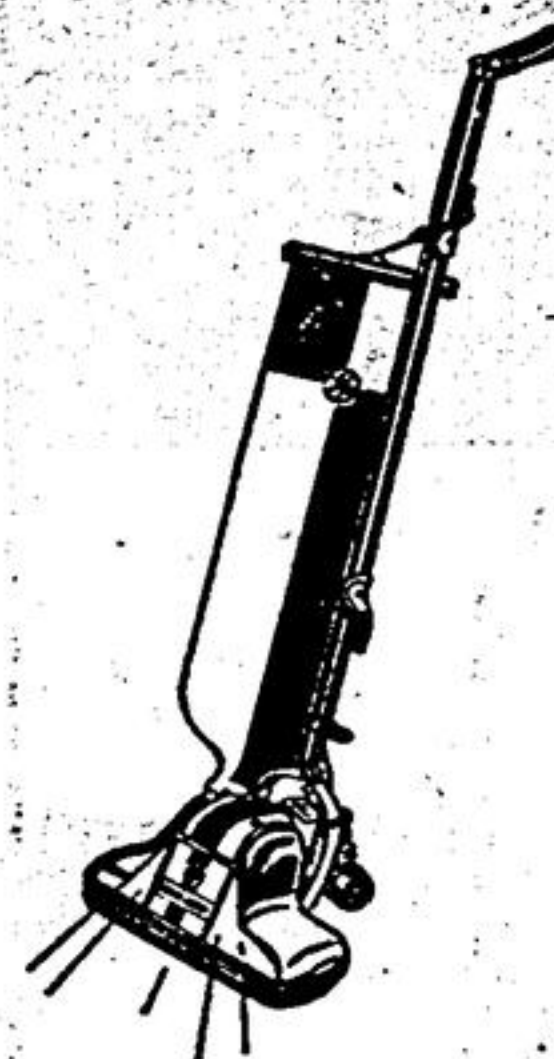

The next meeting of the Community Club will be held at the home of Bert and Mrs. Guthrie on the evening of January 10th. It is to be hoped that the weather will be fine, as a large turnout is looked for.

The annual meeting of No. 5 school was held at the school on Wednesday of last week when some ten ratepayers were present. George Puckrin was elected chairman with Arch Bell the secretary. Following the order of business the report of the trustees was given by the secretary, F. M. Chapman. He explained very fully, and the work of the Board, their meetings and the ways the school and grounds had been cared for. It was felt by the trustees that there should be



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more ways for the pupils to exercise their energies in play, now that the grounds were being put in shape. The encouragement of ball games, and the placing of swings, teeters and slides would help much. The financial report showed that the year closed with a deficit which would necessitate the levy for a little additional money this year. The grants showed that 45% had been received back on the expenditures of last year. An explanation of the meeting of the ratepayers at the school in November and the action of the Board, he believed, was appreciated by nearly everyone. It was moved that the report be received and adopted which

was carried unanimously. The ratepayers suggested that meetings of the parents and teacher and trustees be more frequent. And that the ceiling of the school be insulated. It was also felt that the expense for much of the schools and the school buildings should come out of consolidated revenue so that the incidence of taxation should not rest so heavily on farm lands and on small householders in their improvements to their holdings. As the secretary was the retiring trustee, he expressed a desire to retire. Upon motion by R. E. Hedge and Fred Squire he was nominated. No other move was made, so he was declared elected by the chairman.
