Jack Spang Acquires Extra Land

Mr. Jack Spang, trucker, has purchased the 181/2 acres of land on the Uxbridge townline immediately east of Stouffville from William Griffiths. Purchase price was \$2150, and the deal was negotiated by W. J. Warren Real Estate Agency through their agent Ken Campbell.

The property is located on the east side of the townline between the Leslie Wideman farm and the Water & Hydro St. John property, and is close to Mr. Spang's present place, the Ratcliff. former O'Boyle property.
