Strong County Council Will Have Busy Year In 1950

With elections in all Ontario county municipalities, the personnel of County Council can now be announced by Clerk William G. Manning. With the addition of a deputy-reeve from Thorah Township, there are now 25 members in council. Within a few years, this number may be increased by two or three more as the population of various parts of the county continues to increase.

However voting strength stands at 29 because each of the Pickering representatives have two votes, as well as the reeve of Whitby and the reeve of East Whitby Township. There are seven new faces in county council this year, an average "turn-over" for one election period.

First session is on January 17. A number of important issues will face council early in the year: striking its budget; consideration of establishment of a county health unit; the county homebuilding problems; hiring of a county road superintendent; the Ajax problem and many others. As usual, the councillors have the excellent services of their clerk and his staff, to assist them.

Mennonite Relief Work Outlined

Growth and work of the Mennonite Central Committee was outlined by Cornelius Rempel of Kitchener to the monthly meeting of the Pan Politea Club at Kitchener Monday night.

The speaker traced the history of this organization from its origin in 1920 to last year when \$3,000,000 of clothing and food were shipped from the groups in U.S. and

Canada to needy areas.

Mr. Rempel said he was one of the recipients of the first shipments of food and clothing by the committee to Russia in 1920. Since that time this group has sent aid to many countries, including Germany and Paraguay, who have received a major part of the shipments.

During the Second World War, food, clothing and workers were shipped to Britain, he said. Since the end of the war, the Mennonite Central Committee has gone to Europe, where in 1947, it had 230 workers.
