Players, Fans, Police, in Saturday Hockey Brawl

Bad reports that are understood to have been tabled to the OHA regarding the Toronto Meteors and some of their Club executive got a further airing at Stouffville Saturday night during their 7-4 trouncing at the hands of the Clippers.

Referee Harry Morrison was forewarned of possible trouble, and got it. He called upon the local police to evict the Meteor trainer from the players' box during that second period, when this "gentleman" chose to use some uncomplimentary language on the OHA official. This same trainer accosted local coach Bert Fyfe following the game and was promptly "dusted off."

Players clashed in fisticuffs in the last ten minutes of the game at the mouth of the Clipper net, as Meteors went wild in their efforts to tie the score. While only two majors were meted out, the visitors showed their bitterness in defeat as play continued.

The final bell had barely died away when a wild donny broke loose in the gangway to the players' dressing-rooms. Goalie Bill Mulholland who had turned in a superb job all night was attacked by Joe Formica of Meteors. Immediately the scene was an uproar, with local fans, visiting players and Clippers throwing lusty punches in all directions. Formica, the instigator of the trouble was nearly turned inside out, and much of his gear torn from his back.

The nearby exit was opened and some of the pugilists doused in the sub-zero snowbanks to cool out. Local police were called in but only moved in after the fire had died away. However, it was not a job for a single officer, and local customers appeared to have the visitors well in hand.

Whether the report of this game will bring members of the Toronto Meteors on the OHA carpet is yet to be seen. Meteors are picked by some Toronto sportswriters to bring a Senior 'B' championship to the Queen City, but their bid for a title may be unceremoniously cut short, if they become embroiled in many more outbreaks such as occurred Saturday.

Bud Watson of Unionville with Stratford Junior 'B's, has been up for a couple of games with the Stratford Junior 'A' Club, and is reported to have turned in a good performance.

Bob Lawrie, ex-Markham Millionaire and Stouffville Clipper, is now refereeing regularly in the T.H.L. series.

T. A. Wilson, contractor who erected the new Stouffville Arena, has constructed nine arenas this year, three of them; Stouffville Seaforth and Port Hope with artificial ice.

Aurora Juniors played the first game on their home ice Saturday night.

Markham Millionaires have been negotiating for ice at Newmarket to play their home games. Markham were offered ice in Stouffville, but it could not be arranged on such short notice as the Millionaires wished.

The Clippers will have their first meeting with Orillia in the northern town this Thursday night. Orillia, a band of players made up to a great part of former Junior 'A' players are beginning to click. They tied Toronto Meteors and held Markham Millionaires to a 3-3 tie Saturday night.

Stouffville Clippers have acquired a second goalie in Dan Kewley, regular netminder with Windsor Spitfires last year. Kewley has been working out with the local squad. Bill Mulholland, regular Clipper goal-tender, has been putting up a superb effort since he took over the job, and the one game in six the Club dropped since he started was one of his best performances. The team requires two class A goalies ready for action.

Stouffville Arena's reasonable practice-time rates are appreciated by the Toronto Hockey League. In a recent report, the T.H.L. announced that their organization was financially ahead on their games played here every Tuesday and Thursday, while they were considerably in the red on games played at such Toronto rinks as the Ravina, where the per hour charges are double those in Stouffville.

MARKHAM HOLDS ORILLIA TO TIE, 3-3

Orillia Silver Bombers and Markham Millionaires met on Saturday night in an OHA Senior 'B' contest. Markham started the game with an unbeaten record, having won four games and tied one.

The Bombers took a one goal lead in the first period, outscoring the visitors, 3-2. Markham tied the score in a fast second period, when Reg. Singleton scored the only goal. Neither team scored in the final thrilling 20 minutes and the game ended in a three-all tie.

Parent's Consent Needed Under OHA Proposition

The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association received from George Panter last week a motion that no professional agreement signed by a hockey player under 21 years of age be valid unless signed also by parents or guardian.

He asked that the motion be presented to National Hockey League authorities with whom the CAHA has an agreement.

Panter, representing the Ontario Hockey Association, asked in his motion that a boy, signing a professional agreement, be given a duplicate copy of it.

President Jim Dunn of the Manitoba branch commented he knew of boys going to professional clubs' training camps who were told they had to sign a "C" form before they could get transportation back home. He did not name any club.

The "C" form gives the professional club the right to the signing boy's services if and when he turns professional and may be signed when the boy is as young as 16. A special CAHA committee will place the matter before NHL authorities.

With Couch leading the inspired Clippers to the attack the Meteors became momentarily hemmed on their own end. Checking his man on the blue line Couch sped in and fired the rubber into the empty cage. Not satisfied with this the speedy winger performed the hat trick on a pass from Clarke to end the game.

Smoking in Rink At Waterloo To Be Rather Costly

Smokers who insist in "lighting up" in prohibited areas of Waterloo Memorial Arena in future will be liable to a fine not exceeding \$50.

Waterloo City Council last week gave three readings to a bill prohibiting smoking following a request from the Memorial Arena Commission. Smoking will be allowed in rest rooms and the front portion of the new lobby entrance.

Ald. Donald Roberts said it was realized the bylaw should have been passed before but a recent incident brought home the urgency for a bill of this nature.

Ald. Harry Gould asked whether the penalty was steep enough.

Ald. Arnold Hauck contended the exits at the arena were inadequate. He urged council to investigate the possibility of arranging improved exits.

Smoking is prohibited in the new arena in Stouffville in any of the seat sections, but is allowed in the waiting rooms and lobbys at either end.

THEY LOST THEIR GUNS

Toronto-Ontario's hunters, for the most part, may now put away those high-powered rifles for the year with the closing of the general hunting seasons. Many of them, however, won't have the rifles to put away. Instead, the guns are under seizure and held for sale by the Department of Lands and Forests.

Clippers Run Wild Down Eclipse A.C. 14-6

After a slow first period start Stouffville Clippers suddenly sprang to life midway through the second and poured rubber into the opposition cage from all sides and angles.

Three Sutton men appeared before Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake in court at Newmarket last Friday, charged with unlawfully hunting deer. Convicted, Dr. C. S. Noble was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days, Charles Brooks and James Taylor, \$50 and costs or 15 days.

Harold Van Wyck, conservation officer, said the men were jack-lighting for deer, and he had seized a high-powered rifle on which a flashlight was attached and a battery and spotlight, all of which were in a car.

"If a strong light it turned on a deer at night, it watches the light closely and a hunter can approach almost within point-blank distance before firing," said Van Wyck. He said the offense took place Nov. 1

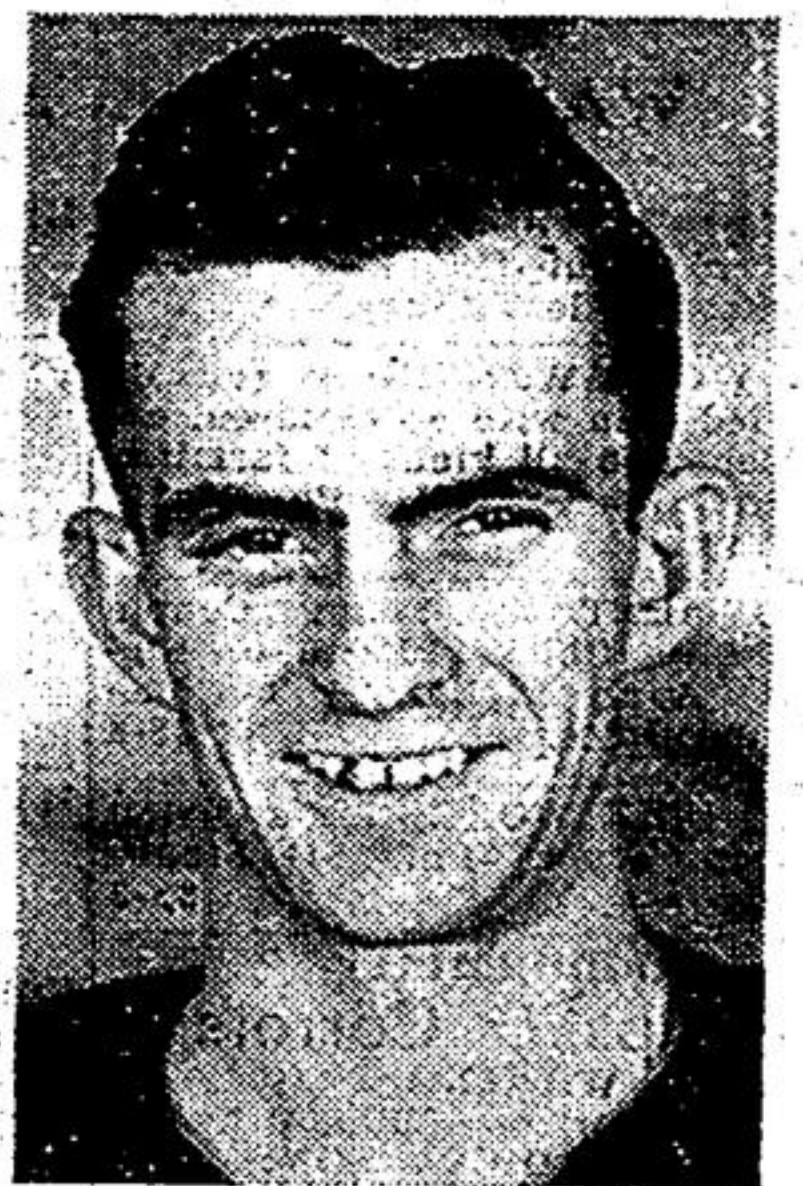
