Farmers Buying Strike Urged at Excited Meeting

Farmers are not going to take the drop in farm prices this time without a real fight for parity prices, it is indicated by a meeting held in the town of Walkerton last week when over 3,000 farmers jammed the hall, and demanded a buyers' strike on the purchase of new farm implements until the Dominion government establish a parity in agriculture.

The farmers came from all over Grey and Bruce counties at the invitation of the Federation of Agriculture, and really made impression on their own ability to become determined.

Floor Prices Demanded. Approved resolutions asked: 1. Floor prices for some commodities: bacon, 30 cents a pound at the packing plant; butter, 58 cents a pound; cheese, 30 cents a pound; eggs, pegged at the previous contract price. 2. Continuance after July 1 of government support prices on all farm commodities. 3. That the Ontario Hog Producers Association set up a central selling agency.

Expected Small Crowd. The gathering heard briefly from Walter Harris, Liberal member of Parliament for Grey-Bruce; from Donald Blue, Liberal M.P. for Bruce, L. E. Cardiff, Progressive Conservative M.P. for Huron North, and Kenzie Foster, Liberal M.P.P. for Bruce. Lloyd Jasper of Mildmay, president of the Bruce Federation of Agriculture, was chairman.

Federation officials said that on account of rain and muddy roads they did not expect an attendance above 600.

But vehicles poured into town, with the final count of farmers nearly doubling the population for the afternoon. All rooms in the Town Hall were filled, and loud-speakers were set up outside for those who couldn't get in.

Several Protests Heard. Then about 500 of the overflow settled in the Memorial Arena. A hockey practice was cancelled and a "shuttle service" of speakers between the Town Hall and the rink was arranged.

Reading of the key resolution was greeted by a wave of applause, but it was not approved until several protests were aired from the floor. They were answered partly from the platform in a noisy scene which was still good-natured.

One of the first to protest about a "buyers' strike," John McDonald of Ripley asked: "We're a fair-minded bunch of people. How would we balance the economy of the country by stopping buying and putting thousands out of work?"

The chairman replied: "I expected to hear that angle. But how are we going to buy if we are producing under the cost of production?"

Another farmer suggested there should be provision for an educational effort among urban people to acquaint them with the farmer's position.

FARMERS GROUP AT THE ROYAL YORK

Colonel Tom Kennedy's speech highlighted the annual meeting of the Ontario Whole Milk Producers' League at the Royal York Hotel on January 4th. Mr. Kennedy stated emphatically that milk prices to producers must be maintained at present levels. He also expressed himself as a strong believer in farm produce marketing agencies and in reply to a direct question from Mr. W. H. Wilmot, Secretary of the Toronto Association, stated an Order-in-Council would be passed to legalize a marketing agency in any market which voted 60% in favour of it.

stand," said another voice. George Johnston, of Owen Sound, zone director of the Ontario Hog Producers Association, warned "it is not our purpose to pull the other fellow down, but to pull ourselves up."

Packers Are Criticized. W. L. Bishop of Norwich, a director of the Ontario Hog Producers Association, criticized the stand of the packing industry in connection with negotiations on the bacon price.

"If the packing industry in Ontario is not willing to play ball with the farmers we must decide whether we will embark on our own co-operative enterprises to take their place," he said.

The resolution on floor prices for bacon, butter, cheese and eggs said that, in view of wartime controls and a government pledge that agriculture would be given adequate peacetime protection, farmers could not accept present prices.

The resolution was moved by George Bothwell of Owen Sound, and seconded by Cecil Daley of Dobbington.

An exchange of letters between James Powers, secretary of the Bruce Federation of Agriculture, and Agriculture Minister James Gardiner was read. In one letter, read by Mr. Jasper, Mr. Gardiner said the Bruce federation's recommendation on the bacon price was being followed.

Mr. Powers, in his reply to Mr. Gardiner asked: "Can you read?" He said the Bruce federation had recommended a price of 30 cents at the packing plant, and not 32 1/2 cents at seaboard.

The meeting endorsed one resolution offered on behalf of farmer-veterans by Gordon Greig and Ed Bell of Blyth, urging government support for farm prices.
