### Spared Worst of Gale

Stouffville and district escaped the worst of last week's terrific gale which swept the southern part of Ontario and did hundreds of thousands dollars damage. Worst hit around Stouffville was the hydro system, but at that current was not off nearly as long as it was in many parts of the province. In town the power went off shortly after nine in the morning on Saturday, and was not restored until nearly noon hour. The break was near Toronto on a main power line. Over at Claremont, however, the current was not restored until late afternoon, and householders who were totally dependant on hydro for cooking and heat were stumped to keep warm and find a way to do a bit of cooking. In the afternoon the gale subsided and shoppers came out in goodly numbers to get their weekly supplies. This week we commence on the second half of a normal winter season, but this year we have scarcely had three or four days of normal cold at one time. The season will go down as one of the most abnormal in more than a quarter century.

### Christian Men's Fellowship Largely Attended

"As I look on such a splendid gathering of men here before me tonight," said J. H. Hunter, L.L.D., addressing the Christian Men's Fellowship in Stouffville, "I am reminded of something that John Wesley once said which was 'Give me one hundred men who fear nothing but God; hate nothing but sin, and are content to know nothing among men but Christ and Him crucified and I will move the world.' Gentlemen there is enough potential power in this church tonight to move the world for God if we are only willing to measure up to the Divine requirements. Here are two texts that I want to leave with you that I feel are appropriate to the beginning of a new year. They are 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, and today, and forever' found in Hebrews 13:8; and the other is from the Book of Nehemiah 2:18, 'Let us rise up and build.' There is a challenge in these words for you and me. Because Jesus Christ is the same, and all power is given unto Him let us therefore rise up and in His strength go forth and build the kingdom of God in human hearts by bringing to them the Gospel message of redeeming Grace."

Mr. Hunter referred in his address on the importance of the Bible to David's love for the Word of God. David committed two of the worst sins in the decalogue, yet God paid such a magnificent tribute to him. Why? It was because of David's wholehearted repentance of the evil he had done, because of his broken heart and contrite spirit that forever sought to find expression in praise to God for His goodness, and the second season is his exaltation of the Word of God. So if we wish to be men after the heart of Almighty God let our mouth at all times be filled with praise for the Divine goodness, and let us exalt the Divine Word in our hearts and in our lives." In closing his address he made a strong appeal for a return to the fundamental things of our faith, and pleaded for a restoration of the Word of God in individual life. The world was reeling upon its foundations and the hearts of multitudes were failing them for fear for the things that were coming upon the earth. The power was ours to move the
