





### Huge Crowd of Nearly 2000 See Local Clippers Thumped by Markham To the Tune of 10-4 (Jim Thomas)

Before 1800 fans, the largest crowd ever to jam into a local arena, the Millionaires and Clippers battled it out on Saturday night. It was the last meeting be-

tween the two local clubs during the regular schedule and the boys turned in a fast clean game from the drop of the puck.

## Senior Playoff Setup To Have Four Teams


