## Huge Crowd of Nearly 2000 See Local Clippers Thumped by Markham To the Tune of 10-4

Before 1800 fans, the largest crowd ever to jam into a local arena, the Millionaires and Clippers battled it out on Saturday night. It was the last meeting between the two local clubs during the regular schedule and the boys turned in a fast clean game from the drop of the puck.

The Watson, Sluce, Jewitt line sparked the Millionaires to their 10-4 win taking part in six of their team's ten markers. The Clippers' scoring was divided evenly throughout the team with each line picking up a goal. Austie Baker notched the other Clipper tally.

The huge crowd of local supporters were naturally stunned by reversal of their favourites. They had watched the Clippers tie Markham's high-scoring trio up in knots at Newmarket, and felt confident of victory on home ice.

The Blueshirts were trying all the way, but were definitely not clicking. Passes went wild, and players fell into the old rut of failing to clear out of their own end until somebody usually took the puck away from them.

At the opening of the period the homesters pressed the Millionaires into their own zone and Stunden was called upon to make some fancy close in stops. At 4:37, with Rose serving a penalty, Brennan broke through and flipped the rubber to Singleton who promptly fired it home to put the visitors one up. A minute later Jewitt and Watson combined to beat Mulholland and give their team a two goal lead. Midway throughout the period Sayliss cut in from the blue line, passed neatly to the uncovered Hopper who blinked the light and put the homesters back in the game once more. In the closing minute Fred Scott led a rush up centre ice passing to Jewitt at the blue line who in turn set Watson up to take a 3-1 lead.

At 3:32 of the second period Austie Baker checked Brennan as he cleared from his own zone and scored only to have Bert Baker tally on a similar play a few seconds later.

Sluce made it five for Markham unassisted at 6:05 and J. Rumney put the visitors farther in the lead at 10:04 from B. Fergie.

A minute later the Watson, Jewitt, Sluce line struck again with Watson picking up his second goal of the night. In the dying seconds of the period Lewis kept his goal scoring record intact bagging one from Thomas who placed the rubber on Stunden's doorstep.

The final period's scoring was all Markham although on the play both teams battled fairly even. Clement scored first followed by goals from Fergie and Jewitt to end the game.

The four top clubs will play off, first against fourth, and second against third. The first rounds will be three-out-of-five, with the group final, a four-out-of-seven affair.

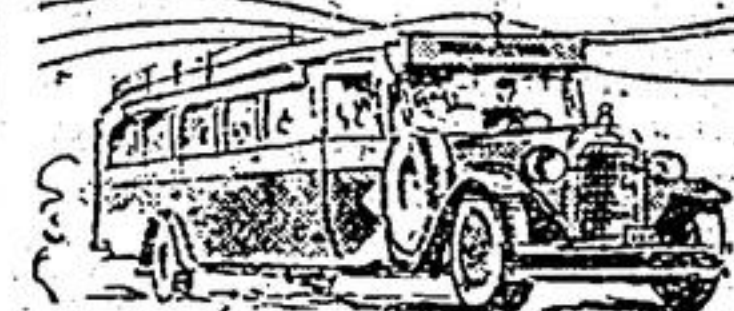
### MRS. W. FRANK BATTY

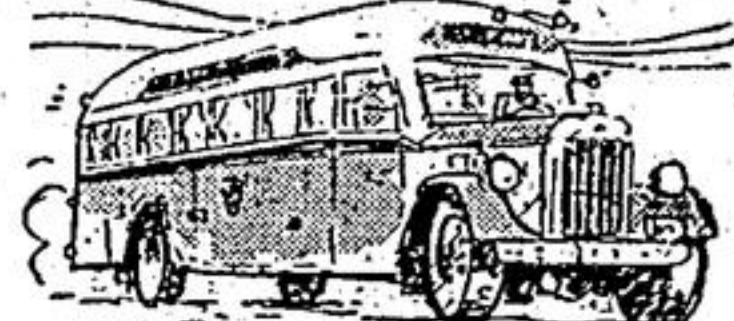
More than 500 sets for radio listening have been given away free in Britain by the Wireless for Bedridden Society.
