A Noranda, Que., hockey referee has an idea that would brighten the lives of his unloved brethren. It would also brighten the already colorful surface of every rink in Canada. Len Howard's suggestion, forwarded to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association by Carl Palangio of North Bay, referee-in-chief of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association, would take one of the occupational hazards out of a referee's life. Stouffville Clippers backed by tight goal-keeping from Jack Harper, snapped back into playoff form on Wednesday night to down Eclipse Knights 4-2 in Brampton.

The Clippers were full value for their win, and after spotting Eclipse a two-goal lead in the first period went on in the second to tie the score and win in the third. Stouffville had an edge in the first period as well, but couldn't beat Hutz in the net. Walker and Dunlap out-manoeuvred Stouffville at 9:23 of the period to score, and pulled the same, play twenty seconds later to score again.

Clarke and Couch were Stouffville marksmen in the mid-period, Couch and Rose getting the assists. Herb Rose, who was a standout for Clippers during the entire game beat Hutz on a smart play in the third period to put the Blue-shirts out in front, and Sayliss clinched the game on a pass from Austie Baker with the fourth goal. The game was fast all the way, and while there were no penalties in the first period, a fracas broke out in the dying moments of the final period when Bradbury broke in alone on Hutz, and the two went down to the ice in a wrestling clinch, both getting majors.
