New School Section Proposed for L. Wilcox

At a ratepayers meeting held in the Oak Ridges School Section (Yonge Street) last week, a decision was reached to urge the formation of a separate school section for Wilcox Lake to comprise lots 65, 67 and 68, Township of Whitchurch, now forming part of the Oak Ridges section. With the lake area created into a new section it was felt the remaining Oak Ridge section could handle its problem better. A four-roomed school was envisioned for the lake where the population is steadily increasing and thereby creating a school problem that so far goes unsolved while children go uneducated because of lack of building accommodation. A lake resident pointed out that

the township council had power to lend financial aid to a struggling section which aid would be at the expense of the whole township. "We can well imagine what the farm ratepayers would say if council saw fit to take taxes from the other sections and appropriate them to Lake Wilcox area, all of whom are overflow residents from Toronto," said one official of the township. If it turns out that the council is forced to give financial assistance to a new section or even the present school section, to enable it to enlarge the school, it would be a strong talking card in favor of a township school board, one ratepayer pointed out. 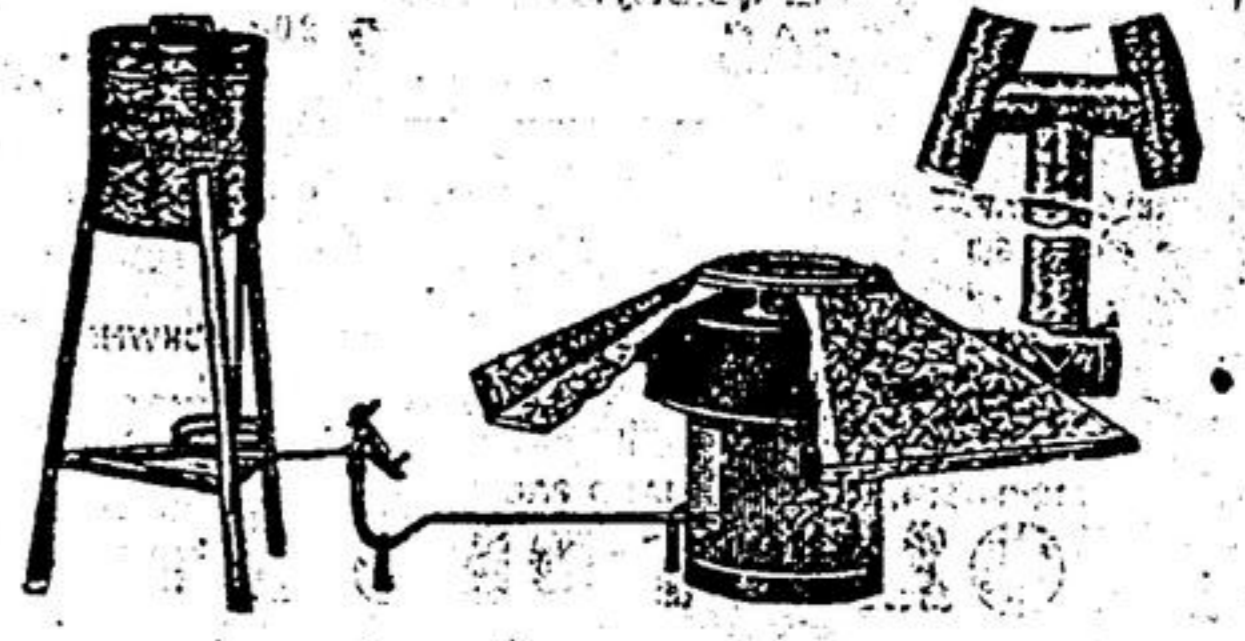
