Dance Hall Machines Must Not Operate On Sundays

Pin ball and such games were classified as little different than common gambling, and will not be permitted to be carried on in Whitechurch Township on the Sabbath day from this out, according to an edict of the Township Council in session on Saturday. A resolution unanimously carried "that council instruct the issuer of amusement hall licenses to advise such operators that halls must remain closed from 12 midnight on Saturday until 7 a.m. on Monday morning during the summer season."

Chief Constable Mulholland said that these gambling devices drew Sunday crowds that caused trouble, and that the action of the council in banning their operation on Sundays would go a long way to removing the undesirable element from crowding about the places they operate in.

The council debated the idea of licensing these machines, then concluded that a license would not stop their operation on the Sabbath day, so the suggestion was approved that places offering such entertainment would only get a hall license by abiding the regulation to close down such machines when ordered. Failure to comply would forfeit the hall license.

Chief Mulholland informed council that 12 dogs have been gathered in by the officers of the Humane Society coming from Toronto. Owners were soon on hand to claim some of the dogs while others were removed to the city pound, from Wilcox Lake area.

Housing Costs Cause Unemployment

There is unemployment in the Canadian woods this winter partly because the people who need and want houses cannot afford to pay the wages demanded by organized workers who produce materials and construct homes, the "Rural Scene," opinions in its last issue.

Wages are eighty per cent of the cost of the materials and the construction of a house. The hourly earnings of organized carpenters, plumbers, electricians, masons, painters, and the prices and costs of those who are engaged directly and indirectly in the house building industry are out of reasonable relation to the wages, prices and costs of farmers, self-employed workers, many factory, office, wholesale, and retail employees, clergymen and other low-paid professional people.

Building costs are too high in relation to the incomes of the people who invest in a house or two when building costs permit a fair return from rents.

There will be continuing sub-normal employment in the house-building industry, from the woods to the last coat of paint, until the costs of house-building come down. Government housing subsidies have been soaked up by shorter hours, increased wages, costs and prices.

There will not be sufficient houses built at reasonable prices as long as the people who need them insist that governments build them at unreasonable prices or that they subsidize the wages of workmen, whose hourly earnings are much higher than those of most of the people who need homes.

More than 200 citizens of Aurora, Ont., donated blood for Gordon Pugh, 28, above, in critical condition at hospital in Newmarket. Hit by car, Gordon, known by all Aurora residents, lay on road more than half an hour awaiting ambulance. At hospital, it was found that due to leg amputation, blood transfusions were needed. Call for rare RH negative B type blood went out and in no time donors poured in. Condition has been reported as "fair."
